It has frequently been said that the incorporators of the City of Estacada "reserved as their own special rights all public utility franchises within the city." This was often heard during the waterworks deal, and the probable electric light deal. The farmers east of town are asking for a right to build their phone into the town, but the city council has deferred the matter until it has settled the question, whether or not the Estacada Telephone & Telegraph Co. holds an exclusive franchise within the city. The farmers east of here are rapidly extending their mutual lines, and naturally wish to enter the town. It is the opinion of a majority of the members of the city council that the exclusive franchise idea is not legal.

In these days of prosperous times W. J. Bryan, the well-known Nebraskaan, is getting fat, weighing 234 pounds. Whether on account of Republican political successes or his success as a lecturer, Wm. does not say.

Two people named Gilman and Corey were married in New York recently and the wedding expenses amounted to more than \$1,000,000. It was a steel affair, and insures the couple but little happiness.

In compliance with an ordinance passed in Omaha all single persons there between the ages of 25 and 45 must get married within 60 days or pay a fine. Widows and widowers are exempt.

The railroad accident in California in which 32 Shriners lost their lives, brings to mind what a pleasant time these people might have had near their homes down East.

The Chicago Board of Trade sent wheat up above a dollar a few days ago. The board won't do the like next fall when the farmers have their wheat ready for market.

Wall street was very much disgusted when it found out that the country had not been paralyzed by its "great panic." Nobody outside of gambling circles paid the slightest attention to it and millions of farmers never even heard of it. This so-called panic was nothing more than a lot of rascally stock jobbing, one gang forcing up the prices of securities and the other trying to hold them down. The securities, of course, remained of the same real value after the flurry that they were before, this value being fixed by their dividend paying capacity and not by manipulation of gamblers. As to the fortunes lost or won—on paper—they amount to nothing to the country at large and nobody would care if every speculator of the gang should go "plum broke."

Secretary Wilson's assertion, No longer can there be any thing like universal crop failure," is a fine assurance, yet it is only a sort of official announcement of a truth which every reflective person has recognized. The diversity of crops, the wider areas cultivated, the changes in climate effected by such soil cultivation and the diffused knowledge of the science of applied agriculture are all contributing safeguards against a disastrous harvest year. Localities, even large areas, may suffer—and doubtless will—at recurrent periods, and the total supply in one year may be less than in the most bountiful times; but against a general dearth of the annual yield the country is as sure as it can be sure of anything. Consequently if there are "hard times" it will be as the result of society conditions. If panic in finance, or depression in business, is encountered it will be a man-made affliction—the unnecessary effect the struggle of special privilege to secure advantages that it is not entitled to—American Farmer.

Railway's New Terminal

Plans for the new terminal for the city and interurban lines of the Portland Railway & Power Company are

as fast as they can be prepared but it is thought that so many details are to be arranged that the complete 6-story building cannot be constructed this year. However, those features of the structure needed in the operation of the city and interurban system will probably be completed during the coming year and the remainder of the improved facilities promised will be added later.

F. I. Fuller says that probably the transforming station at 7th and Alder, will be removed to the new location and the city heating plant to be erected by the company will also be established there within the year. Waiting rooms and train sheds may also be erected this year. These departments of the system will occupy the first two floors of the proposed new building. The whole structure will take more time and will not be finished till next season.

Plans for the entire building are being prepared but the engineers find the work such a large undertaking that the things most urgently needed will be provided for first. The location of the new union trolley car terminal is the block bounded by First, Second, Pine and Ash streets.

A Thrilling Experience

When making a turn in the road the horse became frightened and started to run breaking the harness, and dragging the buggy a short distance. Before the animal broke loose from the buggy the occupants were thrown to the wayside. Luckily no one was hurt although baby Hughson was thrown under the buggy.

Geo. Estes of The Estacada State Bank buys a Railway

George Estes, president of the Estacada State Bank, last week negotiated the purchase of the Medford and Crater Lake Railroad which was sold at receiver's sale. Mr. Estes is vice president of the Oregon Trust & Savings Company, and secretary of the Bank of Drain. Dr. Stryker of the Estacada State Bank is associated with Mr. Estes in the deal. They act for a Portland syndicate, but are personally interested also. The road as far as completed will be equipped and operated out to Eagle Point, 12 miles east of Medford, and as quick as money and labor can do so it will be extended to the Klamath Falls country.

The Estacada Methodist Episcopal Church will be dedicated Sunday, June 2d. Sunday School will meet at 9:30 a. m.; children will be christened at 10:15; sermon at 10:30 by Rev. Clarence True Wilson. Supt. of Waterworks Nicholson was present, and said about one more day's work of pipe laying remained to be done, but that it would be a few days before he would get to that part of the work. T. J. Reagan, on behalf of the Fire Department, appeared before the board and asked for the city's public privileges for Fourth of July Day. A petition from the farmers' mutual telephone company east of town asking for telephone right-of-way in the town, was presented; and, on motion, a committee was appointed to see if the council had any such privileges to grant. It was decided that steps should be taken at once to complete a gravity water supply system. T. J. Reagan was hired to smooth down the city streets, and lay the cross walks.

HALF a century ago the church and the home, directly or indirectly, gave that moral background and ETHICAL DISCIPLINE which every child and youth must absolutely have.

Today the church gets even less hold than the school upon thousands of young people, and the houses of many rich, no less than the tenements of many poor, are MOCKERIES OF HOME. Today, with significant exceptions, a boy must pick up his trade education as best he may, and our huge industrial establishments are transmuting potential citizens into replaceable parts of an UNTHINKING MACHINE.

Before the civil war the children of New England and the middle west imbibed in the town meeting, the children of the south imbibed in that keeness of political atmosphere, the spirit and ideals of democracy bequeathed by those who MADE America. Today hundreds of thousands are pouring in from every corner of the globe, many of them hostile to all forms of government and knowing no distinction between LIBERTY AND LICENSE, all of them needing to be painfully taught the very ELEMENTS of responsible citizenship.

Most significant of all, the development of machinery, with its attendant co-operation and combination of interests, its resulting wealth, luxury, rapid intercommunication, social congestion and complexity, has so bound society together that the moral ruin of the meanest youth fails to assimilate the humblest immigrant affects as
