Council Meets

Some Important Business Transacted

The board of councilmen held a meeting Monday evening. Several bills were allowed and ordered paid. A bill of Al Lindsey for \$250 for work done on the streets was laid over for the reason that the street injunction case is still in the court, and not settled. A petition was received from W. H. Holder, E. L. Wancott and H. V. Trapp asking for telephone rights of way within the city, and an ordinance was read and passed granting such franchises as were asked for. On a request from the Business Men's Club, the board considered it expedient to declare Third street west from Zobrist street, and the alley and Wade St. south of Fourth street vacated and given to the use of the W. H. Judson Railway Material Manufacturing Company. Two replies were received in answer to the notice calling for bids to furnish water pipes for the gravity water system. The Washington Pipe Company did not have time to prepare a bid, and the Pacific Coast Pipe Company's bid did not conform to the requirements and the matter was continued over till the next meeting. The question of paying W. A. Jones a salary for acting as city marshal was left over. Mr. Jones being a councilman, it was thought unlawful to employ him as marshal at a salary.

Estacada's first municipal election took place Tuesday, and passed off with but a ruffle of a disturbance.

About every vote in the city was cast, and three votes were not cast on challenge.

The interest which has been manifested during the past few weeks in the election contest increased until the votes were counted. Every person in the city was anxious to know what the result would be, and when the vote was learned it was a few seconds before the successful side could get wind enough to give expression to their feelings. Some dispute arose over the right of Geo. Hamlin, Chas. Ferry, Clyde Ferry, W. A. White, J. B. Haviland and J. E. Stubbs to vote, but the latter two, White and Ferry were finally permitted to vote after some discussion.

Large Car Manufacturing Shops to Locate in Estacada

Estacada is to have a car material manufacturing factory, if plans Mr. E. L. Fraley and Mr. J. W. Reed have in view shall materialize. The W. H. Judson Car Manufacturing Co. of Portland is in a deal with these men to locate a car manufacturing shop here. The company is formed of practical car makers who have been connected with the Pullman Car Company for years. They have closed a deal for the woodworking factory and grounds, and will want about ten acres more for additional land space. The company has a capital of \$250,000 and will put in a \$300,000 plant, reserving the balance as working capital. It will take about 200 men to operate the plant when finished, which means quite an addition to the population of the place, as Mr. Fraley says the company will employ none but residents of the town. Negotiations are in progress to close the deal as soon as possible. Members of the company were here this week, and a number of resident business men, looked over the location, and visited Cazadero. They were greatly pleased with every feature of the place, and consider it a first-class place for a car manufactory.
