It was our pleasure this week to review a paper handed us by Geo. Lockery. It was the Dec. 29th, 1865 issue of The Western Citizen published at Paris, Kentucky. The paper contains the market reports of that day and we notice beef cattle sold at from \$2.45 to \$3.50 a head and sheep \$15 to \$30. The official publication of the Emancipation Proclamation appeared in this issue of this paper, it having been ratified by 3/4 of the states. The report of the executor of Abe Lincoln's estate, valued at \$85,000 is printed.

In telling about "Uncle Sam's Great Forests and How They Are Protected," The Classmate of July 27 says, among other things: "Every part of the great woods, no matter how remote or isolated, is as well patrolled during the summer months as a city street." This appears to us to be a rather extravagant statement. The author can not mean what he says. Certainly, he can not be "figuratively speaking" for in such an article nothing but plain statements of facts should appear. We can not imagine Rangers Wilcox and Cohoon patrolling their districts "as well as a city street." When next they come out of the hills for grub and other supplies we will interview them on the subject. If Mr. Stovall's statement is so, then we can see one reason why there is so much crime etc. in the cities—because of insufficient police patrol.

Last Sunday was the first Sabbath Estacadians have experienced with closed saloons. The modern innovation of the present day moralists was a success so far as the first act is concerned. What of the ninety and nine that are to follow. The rule of the law worked well, and the proprietors of the saloons observed the law which has heretofore been a dead-letter statute. But very little liquor drinking was indulged in, and the crowds that came here to spend the day picnicking and otherwise in the woods and along the river brought a small quantity of bottled booze compared to what they usually bring. There was a noticeable difference in the kind and character of the crowd of people out to what oftentimes is seen. The reckless individual of whom liquor makes a fool remained away, which is the best result of the Sunday anti saloon law. The Sunday closing affected other lines of business; the restaurant business was not as good as on open Sundays, but the refreshment stands were well patronized. This was partly because of the day being quite warm. No complaints were heard, but the district attorney's mandate and the enforcement league's wishes will have to be observed, it seems.
