## Estacada State Bank Not Connected With Oregon Trust & Savings Bank

A little flurry was witnessed here in the financial circle yesterday when the news was received of the closing of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank's doors in Portland. The impression that the Estacada State Bank was owned by the Portland concern caused a number of depositors to run on the local bank which, of course, was more than the bank was prepared for. The officers of the bank were notified, and at once came out from Portland. A meeting of many of the bank's depositors and the officials was held and the situation explained. Geo. Estes, president, and Dr. Stryker vice president of the bank showed that the Oregon Trust was only a correspondent of the Estacada bank and no other interest existed between the institutions. The Estacada bank was unfortunate to have \$3014 deposited in the Portland bank and in that way its ready money was tied up. Hence the temporary trouble. The wrong understanding of the two banks' connections being explained the business men felt better, and business will continue right along at the Estacada State Bank. The assets of Dr. Stryker and Mr. Estes who own the stock of the bank amounts to \$125,000, enough to pay \$5 for every \$1 on deposit. C. F. Howe, A. E. Sparks, R. W. Cary and T. Vocum were elected a committee to examine the bank's books when it is thought necessary, and the doors will again open at noon today for business.
