The Reason Why

County Judge Dimick gives as an explanation of the debt of Clackamas county increasing the past year so much—

"The 8-hour law enacted at the last legislature has been an expensive proceeding for Clackamas county and has resulted in increased expenditure on the county roads. The roadworkers formerly worked ten hrs a day and new conditions have increased the cost of road building about 1-6th. We also are compelled to pay more for men, and teams get a much higher price than in former years. During the last six months the county court has had to replace about one-half of the plank roads of Clackamas county, and we have in most cases built graveled roads in the place of plank, and while this is lasting, it is also more expensive but will be cheaper in the long run: Bridges have been patched up for years until they could no longer be patched and it has been necessary to rebuild many of them. The cost of most of the bridge work that has been done will be met by the increased assessment of timber lands and railroads and we shall be able to reduce the general levy one mill from the levy of last year. Clackamas county has 360 bridges that are more than 50 feet in length and the people can readily understand it is no small matter to keep these thoroughfares in repair."

The Southern Pacific Company is so far the only corporation in Clackamas county that has filed a complaint with the board of equalization over the amount of its assessed valuation. The company is assessed at \$19,000 a mile which is an increase of \$7,000 a mile over the last assessment, and a total increase of about \$176,000. The company has 21 miles of road in the county, not including the Oswego line. There will very likely be no reduction made.

The crop this year is an extra good one so far as quality is concerned, and the yield in most orchards is also good. Something like 100 tons will be the output from Garfield farms this season. 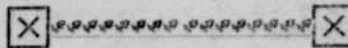

Like J. J. Hill of the Great Northern, E. P. Ripley president of the Atchison railway, declares that railroad building in this country has received a severe shock, and that there will not be much of it so long as the attitude of the public remains as it is today.

The last ten years have probably been the best years of prosperity in the history of the country. How much railroad building has been going on during this time? Probably less than in any decade in the history of our railroads. They raised during the last ten years millions and millions. What have they done with it? Little of it has gone into building new lines and terminals, and most has been used to acquire stocks.

The conditions under which railroads are suffering just now are of their own creation. A number of fair-minded railway presidents have themselves conceded this. Shortcomings of the railroads have simply begun to bear fruit. The people have not been guilty of overcapitalization of the railroads. The people have not encouraged the railroads to borrow money to buy the stocks of other railroads with it. Over a billion dollars' worth of the railroad stocks have been bought by railroads which they dont need at all. They have bought them for speculation instead of borrowing that billion for improvements and extensions.—The Financial World.
