Council Meeting
 The board of councilmen met in special session Tuesday evening at Mayor Haviland's office. Several bills were allowed for work done for the city on its streets and water system. Another discussion concerning the ordinances granting a street franchise to J. W. Reed and others for a site for a car manufacturing factory took place, but nothing was done. The mayor notified the city treasurer, H. Cooper, to prepare and present to the council at its next meeting a financial statement of the city's condition. In view of the fact that a large amount of the dog and poll taxes have not been paid, a collecting agent for the city was appointed to go after all unpaid taxes and make collections. Messrs. Jones and Lovelace each wanted the other to be appointed to do this work. Jones finally won out and he was appointed the city's bad bill collector, with instructions to kill and bury wherever payment was refused. The board will meet again next Tuesday.
