### Brick Factory to Be

#### Operated this Year

The Report Is Current That the Estacada Brick and Tile Factory Will Run in Full Capacity—Will Make Brick for the Market

It is quite certain that the big brick factory of the Estacada Brick & Tile Company in Estacada will be operated at its full capacity the coming summer. The stockholders are figuring on new arrangements and it may be that the interests of the smaller holders in the company will be taken over by one individual and the factory will be started up

again. When the factory closed last fall, several thousand brick had been piled up in the yard. These have about all been sold in the local market. It will be easy for the company to sell all the brick it can make and for that reason the company is thinking of resuming work. Residents of Estacada will be pleased to see the brick works again running.

### Improved Telephone

#### Service For All

Both the Country and Town to Have Longer Day's Connection With Central Exchange

Estacada and vicinity has been given an increased telephone service. The Rural Company which recently purchased all the Estacada Telephone & Telegraph Company's lines and holdings has recognized that an increased service should be given the patrons and with that idea in mind arrangements have been made to keep the local telephone exchange open several hours longer during each day. Heretofore the exchange has opened at 8 o'clock in the morning and closed at 8 o'clock in the evening, with an hour closed at noon and at evening. The ex-

change will be open continuously under the new arrangements from 8 a. m. till 9 p. m. Two operators are employed now in place of one and one works in the forenoon and one in the afternoon. Officers of the company met last Thursday and employed Miss Gertrude Morrow as operator to assist Miss Mary Womer. The new system began Monday morning. The company now has something over a hundred patrons on its line with phones, and it is probable that the Currinsville line will be connected with it soon. Patrons are pleased with the change
