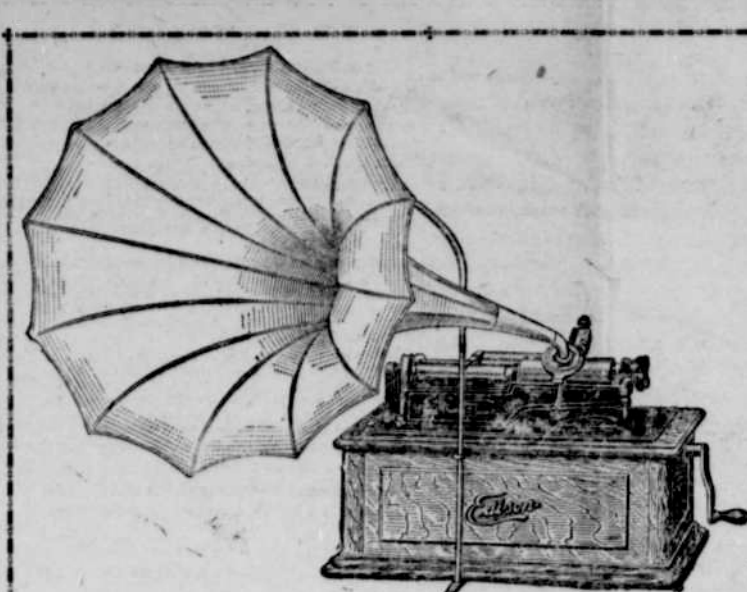
The City Council Pays Bills—Relieves the Old Mayor and Takes a New One

COUNCILMAN JONES RESIGNS

A regular session of the town council took place at the recorder's office Tuesday evening. All members and the mayor were present. After approving the previous meeting's minutes, the following bills were allowed:

W. K. Haviland submitted his resignation as mayor to take place at once providing a successor be chosen before adjournment. The resignation was accepted. W. A. Jones was elected chairman, and J. F. Lovelace then nominated W. A. Heylman for mayor to fill the unexpired term. On roll call four councilmen, Dale Howe, Surface and Lovelace voted yea, and Jones voted no. Mr. Heylman appeared before the board and made a few appropriate remarks, and requested that he be permitted to take the oath of office at a later meeting. Councilman Jones handed in his resignation which was accepted, and on motion Wm. Dale was elected chairman pro tem. An adjournment was then taken.

America Is Ruled by Half a Dozen Men.

By Congressman W. BOURKE COCHRAN of New York.

DURING THE LAST TEN YEARS THE ENTIRE CONTROL OF PRODUCTIVE AGENCIES HAS PASSED INTO THE HANDS OF A FEW MEN—NOT A DOZEN IN NUMBER, LESS THAN HALF A DOZEN. FRANKLY, IF YOU ASK ME TO GIVE THE NAMES OF THOSE WHO ENTIRELY DOMINATE THE ENTIRE INDUSTRIAL FIELD I COULD NOT MENTION MORE THAN FOUR TO SAVE MY LIFE, AND IF I MENTIONED THEM I AM QUITE SATISFIED THAT YOU WOULD ALL REALIZE THAT THEIR COMBINATION IS STRONGER THAN ANY GOVERNMENT THAT EVER EXISTED.

The agencies of production—that is, the source from which commodities are created and the agencies of transportation by which they are exchanged—are dominated by LESS THAN HALF A DOZEN MEN. I think we will take the names of Rockefeller, Morgan, Hariman and Hill, and for a fifth we will say Armour, and you have all that PRACTICALLY CONTROL THE IMPORTANT INDUSTRIES AND AGENCIES OF TRANSPORTATION. Not merely do they control these agencies, but by the influence which this control gives them of VAST DEPOSITS they have come to dominate our financial institutions, our great insurance companies, our leading banks and trust companies.

WHAT, THEN, DOES IT SIGNIFY BUT THAT THEY CONTROL NOT MERELY THE AGENCIES OF PRODUCTION AND EXCHANGE, BUT CONTROL THE AGENCIES OF CREDIT—THE ENTIRE INDUSTRIAL LIFE OF A COMMUNITY?

The power has been transferred from the officers who were chosen to powers whose identity we cannot even fix, for, although I have given four or five names of those who are associated with the domination of these enterprises, THERE IS NO CERTAINTY THAT THEY ARE REALLY THE PERSONS THAT CONTROL THEM.

Mr. Rockefeller, for instance, is generally assumed to be a dominant figure in the oil industry and other corporations, but he himself has said he has NOTHING to do with them, and there are no means of determining whether the public impression or his denial comes the nearer to the truth.

We have had all manner of government, but we have NEVER BEFORE had a government exercising all the power without knowing who proposed it. We have had despots all through the history of the world, and some of them were very capricious. Sometimes they disappeared from public gaze while their decrees were being executed, but THERE WAS NEVER ANY DOUBT AS TO THE IDENTITY OF THE DESPOT.
