As near as can be ascertained the plan was to assassinate Premier Franco and then depend for success upon street risings, support-ed by secret Republican and labor or-ganizations armed with bombs and revolvers.

The conspirators intended to take advantage of various festivities to carry out the coup d'etat. The royal family vas at Villa Viciosa, entertaining the luke of Abruzzi. Most of the army and navy officers who were in the city were attending a gala performance at the theater, while many of the chief functionaries of state were present at a magnificent ball at one of the legations.

Mrs. Stoessel a Grafter.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 24.-Testimony showing the straits of the civil population of Port Arthur during the seige was given at the court martial of General Stoessel today by Colonel Vershin-in. According to Colonel Vershinin mere existence was a luxury, for civilians. Prices were enormous, a cow cost \$800, a pig \$500 and eggs \$1 each. He estified that Madame Stoessel had a large herd of cattle and a flock of chickens and charged exorbitant prices. Shortly before the surrender, he said, she attempted to dispose of these.

Says Japan Will Welcome Fleet.

San Diego, Jan. 24 .- That Japan, far from entertaining the possibility of a war with the United States, has not culy the friendliest feelings towards this country, but is preparing to wel-come the fleet of Admiral Evans upon its arrival in the Pacific, is the assertion of Sakuyei Takahaski, proferssor of international law in the Imperia university of Tokio, who is a guest at the Hotel Coronado. "The educated people of Japan," he declared, "have only the friendliest of feelings toward America."

Rent Strikers Arrested
