Children between the ages of 9 and 14 years are required by the state school laws to attend school when there is school in their home district. School Superintendent, Gary has appointed J. F. Lovelace trustee officer for this district. The duty of this officer is to see that the attendance of children at school is complied with according to law. Parents having children who are not attending school had better look the law up, as Mr. Lovelace has orders to see that all children attend school unless a valid excuse can be given by them.

Officers of the Estacada Telephone & Telegraph Company held a meeting at their office last Saturday. The meeting was for the purpose of coming to an agreement with the Currinsville line, and Mr. Elliott in regard to the North Eagle Creek line. This line which is building out towards Dover will connect with Mr. Elliott's store at Eagle Creek, and the service will be the same as on the other rural lines. Patrons of the Currinsville rural have not yet decided what they shall do—connect with Eagle Creek or Estacada. It is quite likely that the Estacada company will become a stock company, as the efforts to make it a mutual together with all the rural lines have not been successful. The expense of maintaining the local office has been in excess of the receipts, and a change is desired by those most interested in the company so that the business will be at least self supporting. The company's annual business meeting takes place the 11th.

#### Lovelace-Forbes Justice Trial

## Foreign Banking System Better Than Ours.

By FRANK A. VANDERLIP, Vice President of the National City Bank, New York.

FOR more than forty years under the operation of the national banking act we have seen the ANNUAL RECURRENCE OF THE FALL DEMAND FOR A LARGER AMOUNT OF CURRENCY for use as a medium of exchange. In no single year since the passage of that act has the volume of notes shown a NATURAL tendency to increase with this fall demand and decrease when it has ceased and currency become redundant. The issue and retirement of national bank notes are almost entirely regulated by investment consideration affecting government bonds and are influenced but slightly by additional demands or decreased needs for currency.

IN RESPECT TO BRANCH BANKING OUR LEGISLATION IS UNIQUE. THE LAWS OF EVERY OTHER IMPORTANT NATION ENCOURAGE BRANCH BANKING, AND THE RESULTS OF IT HAVE NEVER TENDED TO ENSLAVE THE PEOPLE, TO BUILD UP DANGEROUS MONOPOLIES NOR TO INCREASE THE INTEREST RATE.

The result, in fact, has been quite the reverse. Rates are kept uniform over a wide territory, THE TENDENCY TOWARD VIOLENT FLUCTUATIONS IS REDUCED, and the privileges and benefits of safe banking are widely disseminated. I believe there are groundless fears in many directions in regard to the possibility of evil from MONOPOLIES, but of all commodities the last one that will ever be successfully monopolized will be CREDIT.
