Falls Crossing on Eagle Creek

A new bridge at the Falls on Eagle Creek and a good road out on the south side seems to be an assured thing. The right-of-way for the road has been secured. Those whose property it passes through are Fred Bates, M. R. Maury and D. M. Marshall, although it is of no particular damage to any one but Mr. Bates, and he is to receive \$100 for the right over his land. This money has been raised by popular subscription. The other property owners affected will not ask any pay, but will deed a right-of-way to the county. It is about 3/4 of a mile from the bridge site at the top of the grade. Farmers living in the neighborhood will contribute work on the grade, and the district will complete the work. This crossing and road will give the farmers living in the George, Bissell, Dover and Douglass settlements a way to get to Estacada without going several miles out of their way. The road up the hill will not be over an 8% grade.

These cars have been put on for quick, express service.
