## Dr. C. B. Smith

Dr. C. B. Smith died on Saturday the 14th at the age of 61 years, 8 months and 4 days. The funeral was held Monday at Dunning's undertaking chapel in East Portland, under the auspices of the Oddfellows. The members of Estacada lodge 175, I. O. O. F. and Centennial Rebekah lodge hired a special car and went from Estacada to Portland, received the remains and the mourners and from there went to Oregon City where the burial took place at Mountain View cemetery with the impressive ceremonies of the orders. Dr. A. Leroy, grand chaplain conducted the services with the assistance of the lodge members. The pall-bearers were, Wm. McGardle, M. H. Stevenson, Edgar Martin, W. J. Buxton, W. M. 102 and B. Klotz of the Portland Relief committee. The illness that caused Dr. Smith's death was contracted in Chicago last summer while the doctor was on a trip east. He was a native of N. York, but spent the past 30 years practicing medicine in this and Multnomah counties. The near relatives are the widow, a son, Simeon, and two cousins, C. D. and D. C. LaTourette of Oregon City. The floral decorations at the funeral were very pretty, and were contributed by the Estacada school children, and Oddfellows, Fern Hive of Maccabees and the Centennial Rebekah lodge of Estacada.

Eagle Creek High and  
Doing Damage

The heavy rains brought Eagle creek up to the high water mark, and the little stream took on such a current that all the approach on the north end of the Eagle creek wagon bridge was taken out, and landed up against the railroad bridge which is a couple rods below the wagon bridge. The washout of this bridge takes out the last wagon crossing on the creek, and shuts off travel between the North and South sides. For a time it was thought that the railroad bridge was endangered but so far trains have not been interfered with. The county will have the wagon bridge repaired at once. About fifty feet of approach, fifty feet high was swept away.
