The Morning Oregonian is doing more than any other agency in the state to bring about the election of George E. Chamberlain as United States Senator from Oregon.

Olds & Reed have been awarded the contract by Clackamas county of building the new county wagon bridge across the Clackamas river at Estacada. The price for the main part of the bridge is \$5,800, and the approach works are to be built by the foot. The contractors expect to begin work as soon as they can get material for the concrete work.

Republicans can give no excuse for voting against H. M. Cake for United States senator. He received more votes than Geo. E. Chamberlain and therefore he is the people's choice for the office, and since the democrats have been claiming all along that politics should cut no figure in it, they should turn in and make Mr. Cake's election unanimous. If they don't, they will be playing politics.

Few Surprises Develop. No. 1 Carries Everything In Sight

The primary nominations passed with but very little excitement in Estacada. Only 130 out of a total registration of 236 votes were cast. Of these 25 were democrats and 105 were republicans. The polls were opened at 12 o'clock with Ed. Linn, W. W. Davis and Henry Epperson as judges, and D. F. Warner, John Ely and E. T. Davis as clerks. The canvassing board consisted of John C. Tracy, C. Krigbaum and H. H. Anders, judges, and John F. Lovelace, A. N. Johnson and D. F. Warner (who acted for J. O. Linn) as clerks. David Bridenstine acted in the capacity of deputy sheriff and Al Havens was made city marshal for the day.

The Postoffice Department Gives a Few Suggestions

In the matter of discouraging patrons of rural delivery from placing loose coins in their boxes (referred to in circular letter N-757 of January 20, 1908), postmasters and rural carriers should bring to the attention of patrons of rural delivery the advantages derived from the use of embossed stamped-envelopes—the reasonable price at which they are sold above the value of the stamps thereon; the fact that if spoiled by the purchaser they are redeemable in stamps at postage value; and that a return-card is printed on the envelopes, bearing the number of the rural route and name of post office, with a blank line on which the user's name may be written, insuring return of undelivered letters to the writer free of cost.

Patrons of the rural delivery service should be encouraged to purchase the stamped-envelopes in packages of twenty-five or more.
 Postmasters and rural carriers should also invite the attention of patrons to the books of stamps furnished by the Department. These are issued with 24 one-cent, 12, 24 and 48 two-cent postage stamps. The sheets of stamps are interleaved with oiled paper to prevent premature sticking, this protects the stamps, and the book affords a convenient form for keeping postage stamps in the pocket, home or office. The price is 1 c per book over the value of the stamps contained therein.
