RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS IN National Forest. Beginning at the north bank of the Clackamas river where it crosses the north boundary line of section 26 in township 3 South, range 4 East, and running north to the west boundary of section 26 in township 3 South, range 4 East, and thence west along the west boundary of section 26 in township 3 South, range 4 East, to the west boundary of section 26 in township 3 South, range 4 East, and thence south along the south boundary of section 26 in township 3 South, range 4 East, to the south boundary of section 26 in township 3 South, range 4 East, and thence east along the east boundary of section 26 in township 3 South, range 4 East, to the east boundary of section 26 in township 3 South, range 4 East, and thence north along the north boundary of section 26 in township 3 South, range 4 East, to the north boundary of section 26 in township 3 South, range 4 East.
