He said that he would not favor two high schools because two would be but little better than one, but that he would favor a plan that would give to all the girls and boys, high school privileges at their home. Such a plan was evolved and met with his and State Superintendent Ackerman's approval.

All this talk about his favoring Oregon City at the expense of the country is "political rot" and should be beneath the dignity of any aspirant for that office.

**High School Discussed**  
 To the Editor:  
 Much has been said and written apropos the county high school in Clackamas county.  
 If the voters of this county vote "yes" on this question the school board, as provided in the school law, would locate the school at Oregon City; and no one could blame them for such location.  
 Now, suppose Estacada and contiguous territory has 5 or 10, or 20 high school students to be educated. The tuition at the County High School is free, do you say? Yes. Does the county furnish board, care, clothes etc. free gratis? No. For every high school student, sent from any place to any school, understand that from \$200 to \$300 a year is necessary for that student's maintenance. This amount would be kept at home were he able to secure instruction at home.  
 Students of the high school age need careful, kind and considerate attention and supervision, such as only the home can give. If they must go from home to finish the high school, they had better be sent to the preparatory department of some good college, where they will come in contact with the ennobling and uplifting influence of teachers, and young people from the various sections of the Northwest; and also given supervision by persons especially trained and employed for that purpose.  
 True, there are good and bad elements in all schools and school towns; but the chances in a college town, for restraint, are better than

 on Oregon City's streets, or Portland's, either.  
 Let Oregon City take advantage of the union high school law, and unite with some of her contiguous districts for a union high school. Then those taxed would share more directly in the benefits derived and would also have a first class school.  
 Let Estacada do likewise; build up a good union high school; tax herself but slightly on her large amount of assessable property for her share in supporting the same, thus receiving benefits more in proportion to the taxation; make arrangements whereby the principal of the high school shall also supervise the public school, and build up a school system that will do more toward attracting a better class of homeseekers and producing better citizens than all else combined.  
 No separate building would be necessary at this time, or probably for some time to come. The extra room in the Estacada school building could be utilized. I doubt the practicability of having a separate building, especially at this time. The only cost that would accrue would be furnishings for the room and a teacher's salary.  
 Think it over, and advance the interests of yourself and neighbors by establishing a union high school at Estacada at the school election in June. Now is the time to begin steps in that direction.
