Clackamas county seems to occupy a prominent place on the maps when it comes to electing delegates to national conventions. Four years ago James U. Campbell was a delegate to the republican national convention, and this year C. G. Huntley is a delegate to the Chicago convention.

The county commissioners have let the job of rebuilding that part of the Eagle creek wagon bridge that was taken away by high water, and the repairs are nearly completed. The approach is being put up in a more substantial way than the old one was. Pile supports are being put in. The rest of the bridge is to receive repairs.

Richard L. Greaves, candidate for sheriff, has the unanimous support of his party and will receive a good vote around here. Mr. Greaves has by close and careful attention to his work and business held the position of foreman in the blacksmith shops of the Willamette pulp & paper factory for 19 years. Merit has won, and if he is elected sheriff he will give the people of Clackamas county a safe and businesslike administration.

The "Reddy" amendment to the constitution which is causing such a lot of talk reads as follows:

Corporations may be formed under general laws, but shall not be created by the Legislative Assembly by special laws. The Legislative Assembly shall not enact, amend or repeal any charter or act of incorporation for any municipality, city, or town. The legal voters of every city and town are hereby granted every power to enact and amend their municipal charter, and the exclusive power to license, regulate, control and tax, or to suppress or prohibit theaters, race tracks, pool rooms, bowling alleys, billiard halls, and the sale of liquors, subject to the provisions of the local option law of the State of Oregon within the corporate limits of any municipality, is vested in such municipality.

The political meetings which took place in Estacada last week were well attended, considering the bad condition of the weather. On Friday evening the Democrats held forth. The principal speaker of the evening was A. King Wilson, candidate for joint representative for Clackamas and Multnomah counties. All the other candidates on the Democratic ticket were present, and addressed the meeting. There was another rally on Saturday evening to hear the republicans speak. But four candidates were present. Richard L. Greaves, for sheriff, made a few well-taken remarks, and Chauncey Ramsby, for recorder, promised another term of economical and efficient service. H. S. Moody was present but his name was not called for a speech. James U. Campbell made the main address on the program, and gave special attention to the most important amendments and laws to be voted on at the election.
