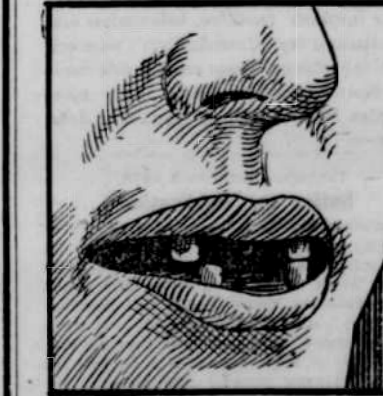

## MANY ARE HOMELESS

Storm in Texas and Oklahoma Creates Awful Havoc.

## POPULATION IS DUMFOUNDED

Loss of Life Believed to Be High—Thousands of Head of Live-stock Killed.

Dallas, Tex., May 26.—Seven thousand persons are practically homeless and shelterless now as a result of the violent storm which broke over Northern Texas and Oklahoma Sunday night. Today alone fully 2,000 people were driven from their homes by the rising winds from the Trinity river. Houses, barns and everything in the path of the terrible flood is swept down and carried away. Trinity river is a raging, surging torrent and nothing apparently far removed from the river proper are flooded, bridges have been swept away like kindling wood. Live-stock by the thousands have perished and fear is now entertained that a great famine will follow in the wake of the storm's fury.

So far no arrangements of a character calculated to relieve the intense suffering of the inhabitants have been attempted. It is really too soon to give any real estimate of the dead. With the abatement of the rising waters steps will be taken at once to help those in dire distress. As usual in such cases, the poor of the various cities and towns in the path of the elements are suffering the worst.

The present storm is by far the most violent of the present year, and for that matter perhaps the worst storm that has visited Northern Texas in several years. It was exceptionally severe at Fort Worth, Dallas, Wichita Falls, Denton and Abilene. The property loss will run extremely high, but so far cannot be conservatively estimated can be placed on the whole. At Fort Worth alone it is figured out that the storm will cause close onto \$100,000 damage. When suburban places are finally heard from the loss will run much higher in that vicinity.

Reports from Mineral Wells state that Wade Owens and Ernest Stetler were drowned there. Persons are also reported drowned near the Falls and Children. At Denton an unknown man lost his life in attempting to save some household effects. All over the storm-swept district railroads and crops have suffered heavily. Rail traffic is practically at a standstill, as at most points bridges have been torn from their foundations by the surging flood water. As quickly as possible the railroad people will repair the damage done. In any event, it will be many days before anything like schedule time can be maintained on any of the roads.

## ANARCHY IN PERSIA.

State Apparently Helpless to Cope With Situation.

Berlin, May 26.—Advice received here as to the effort that is being made to prevail throughout Persia. As an example of the Shah's helplessness to cope with the situation a libel action is cited which has been brought against the Persian newspaper *Musavverat*, as an article in that paper of Persian territory are in the control of brigands and revolutionists, and concluding with the following: "The governors are tyrannical, the administration is corrupt and inefficient, the taxes are in arrears, the exchequer is empty, the soldiers' wages are unpaid and the army is helpless. What is the Shah going to do in these melancholy circumstances? He devotes himself to idleness night after night until daylight."

The newspaper proceeds to give proof of its allegations and concludes by demanding the dethronement of the Shah and the establishment of a republic. The Shah brought a libel action, but withdrew it when the editor offered to prove the charges in detail. Following this, the walls of Teheran were covered with placards calling upon the people to assassinate the monarch.

## Saves Rat, Is Arrested.

Pittsburg, May 26.—For trying to save a half-drowned rat from being tortured to death, Thomas Morris was arrested yesterday after he had been badly beaten by Joseph H. Smith. Morris saw a crowd of men around the rat, and Smith was poking it with a stick. Morris struck Smith and a fight followed, in which Morris received several cuts on his head. Policeman Kenwick Ewart arrested both men. Magistrate Brady commended Morris and sentenced Smith to pay a fine of \$15, or serve 20 days in the workhouse.

## Funeral Services for Governor.

Reno, Nev., May 26.—In response to a call issued by Acting Governor D. S. Dickerson and Mayor Kerman, all business was suspended here yesterday on account of the funeral of Governor John Sparks. The funeral services were held at the Elks' home, where the funeral procession formed. All the bells in the city tolled. The body was escorted by the governor's staff and a body of police. Besides the governor's friends, members of the secret orders to which he belonged at state and city officials, many marched on foot.

## Deadly Gas for Burglars.

Stuttgart, May 26.—A chemical firm in the small town of Aalen has perfected and patented an invention that threatens burglars with instant death after they succeed in opening a safe vault door, either by skeleton key or with the aid of compressed air, nitroglycerine and other burglars' paraphernalia. The moment an intruder opens the door, or holes through it, poisonous gases are released, destroying the invader and leaving him dead on the floor.

## Meat Inspectors Confer.

Chicago, May 26.—More than 100 meat inspectors were present yesterday at the opening of a conference which considered the enforcement of the new meat inspection law. Secretary of Agriculture Wilson is directing the deliberations of the conference. It is expected to continue for three days.

## DAIRYING IN DENMARK.

Land Worked for Hundreds of Years Still Beats Ours.

That American farmers and promoters of agricultural industries are rather lax in grasping their opportunities, and are in danger of being outgeneraled in the markets of the world, unless they improve their methods, is the belief of Dean James E. Russell, of Columbia University, New York. Dean Russell was recently a visitor at the state college, and during his stay there addressed an assembly of the teachers of the Inland Empire, who were attending the teachers' institute in Pullman. Relative to the problems just mentioned, he said:

"Thirty years ago New York was sending butter and cheese to the London market. New York butter and cheese were ruling out similar products from Ontario, and other parts of the world. Just thirty years ago Denmark began to think she could make butter and put it in the London market. The question was, How could she overcome the lead that New York already had in the London markets? She sent men to London to study out the ground; to find what London wanted. Then she set about to give them the required product. "Denmark is a country of poor soil, which has been tilled and overworked for a thousand years. Nevertheless, the Danish population annually sells in the London market some \$25,000,000 worth of butter. In 1903 the entire United States exported only \$1,044,000 worth of butter. In addition to the vast quantity of butter mentioned, Denmark sends out one-fifth as much pork as we do, and just as many horses; and certainly, we should lead the world in the breeding of horses. In the meantime the Danish nation has taught the hens how to work. Four hundred and fifty thousand dollars worth of eggs were exported by this country in 1915, and in 1903 this export had reached a value of \$8,092,000. In the last ten years Denmark has taken \$8,000,000 worth of cheese to the United States. New York, which she has fed to Danish cows and pigs, and then placed the latter in the European markets in successful competition with similar products from America."

"I said a moment ago that twenty years ago the competitor of Denmark was the State of New York. In these twenty years the Danish people have increased their exports from \$1,000,000 to \$40,000,000. In the same twenty years farm values in the State of New York have decreased \$200,000,000. In the last fifteen years Ontario has outbid New York in the same way in the cheese market. Twenty years ago New York companies received Canadian cheese and put the New York stamp on it to get one cent more in the English market. Today the New York farmers are sending their cheese over the Canadian boundary and paying two cents per pound in order to sell it at all."

Showing the superiority of European methods of education in comparison with American education, Dean Russell said:

"Wurtemberg is a small German state, a little larger than the Inland Empire of Eastern Washington, and having a population of about two million persons. Thirty years ago Wurtemberg began to realize that her population was beginning to dwindle; that something had to be done to maintain her integrity as a state. So she set about building up a system of schools for all the people; that would help the plowboy who wished to be a carpenter, a plumber, or a farmer, in the same degree, according to his needs, as they would assist the youth who desired to be a lawyer, an engineer, or a physician. Today Wurtemberg has a university giving courses of world-wide fame; technical schools, weaving and manufacturing schools; two hundred and thirty industrial schools in towns and villages; schools for metal workers, and workers in the textile trades; schools of art, of agriculture, of preparation for household management; and numerous farm schools, and high schools throughout the state."

"Wurtemberg, a state but little larger than the Inland Empire of Eastern Washington, supports all these institutions, with an income of ten dollars per head of population. What would American citizens think if in addition to supporting agricultural colleges, they were asked to support five hundred technical and industrial schools for every two million of population? This is what is being done in the small state of Wurtemberg, and from the point of view of American citizens today, it is almost inconceivable, the contemplation of which must lead any American citizen to infer that his country has much to do to learn before it can successfully compete with the old country in the products of industrial education."

## Answers to Queries.

Haverford, Pa.—Is it considered that hog raising is practically in the northeastern part of the United States? H. W.

"It is probable that there is no place in the United States where the prices for pork products average as high as in the Pacific Northwest. A condition of significance, too, is that the people of this region are not sufficiently alive to the necessity of their meeting the demand for pork products. Those who are in the business are making money. It is an improving, however, for at the present time we note a growing tendency among farmers to pay more attention to this business. The Berkshire breed is preferable, in my opinion, although the Duroc Jersey are making some headway. At the experiment station we have about concluded that a cross of these two breeds would be better than either one by itself."

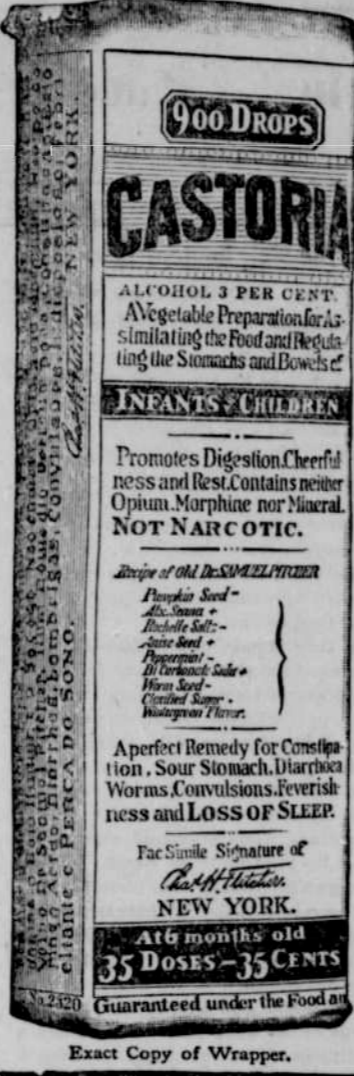
