It is doubtful if a majority of the members of the legislature will be pledged by Statement No. 1. At best the Statement No. 1 forces will have but a bare majority in the legislature. Of the Republicans elected to the house of representatives 28 are pledged to Statement 1, and of those elected to the senate seven are so pledged. A farmer residing near Centerville, desires to know the best method of raising peas, and the most desirable variety; also, with regard to combining peas with oats. The Station supplied him with the following information:

"The experience of the Experi-ment Station staff, leads us to be-lieve that almost any of the com-mon field variety of peas will grow wall in your region. We advise the Black-Eyed Marrow Fat as the best concert variety of peak as the best Black-Eyed Marrow Fat as the best general variety. Ordinarily we sow the peas at the rate of one to one and one-haif bushels per acre, disk-ing or drilling them at least four inches deep. Sow-the oats about a week after the peas are sown, as the latter grow so much stronger and consequently, the oats will be smothered out unless they are given the advantage. We do not consider that oats and peas are as good for horses as for cows. The mixture makes very rich, nutritious hay."


