Oregon pioneers are having their annual reunion in Portland. The G. A. R.'s will meet at Newport on the 24th. Willamette Valley Chautauquah at Gladstone, July 7-19th. Fred Morris, who holds the bonds issued by the city of Estacada in payment of the water system, has begun suit against the city to enforce payment of interest on the same. The bonds draw five per cent. interest, and it is payable every six months. No interest has ever been paid, and it now amounts to nearly \$4,000. There are two reasons why the city has not met this obligation. First, there have been no funds to pay with, and second, the present mayor and city council consider the bond issue illegal and are disposed to bring it to a test at law. It is claimed that the debt incurred by the issuance of these bonds is in excess of the amount which the charter says the city may contract.

**Cazadero Fish Hatchery**  
Excellent results are being accomplished at the state's fish hatchery on the Clackamas river three miles above Estacada. Superintendent E. C. Greenman, who has charge of the operations at the new plant, is much encouraged over the prospects for a good year's work. At present they have about 350,000 Steelhead eggs in the pans which are in fine shape. It is believed that the hatch will be made with about a loss of only 18% which is better than usual; the loss usually is 25%. The run of Steelhead will end this week. Chinook are beginning to come up in good numbers, and work of securing the eggs will begin at once. This is a good fish year, and results which will be accomplished at this little station will be very good compared with the expense to the state of maintaining it.

The railway company have consented to run a special fruit car on this line during the berry season.

## Danger of Appeals To the Mob Spirit.

By Former Governor FRANK S. BLACK of New York.  
WHOSOEVER AROUSES THE MOB OR THE MOB SPIRIT PLAYS WITH FIRE. HE MAY NOT HIMSELF BE BURNED, BUT OTHERS WILL. IT IS SELDOM THAT AN INCENDIARY IS HIMSELF BURNED OR LOSES ANYTHING IN THE FLAMES, BUT THE INCENDIARY IS IN A CLASS FAR HIGHER THAN THE DEMAGOGUE. ONE DESTROYS ONLY PROPERTY AND OCCASIONALLY A HUMAN LIFE, WHILE THE OTHER UNDERMINES SOCIETY ITSELF, ARRAYS CLASS AGAINST CLASS, AROUSES, STIMULATES AND CHEERS THE GROSSER PASSIONS, WHICH IN FULL SWING MAY BRING THE GOVERNMENT ITSELF TO ITS KNEES.  
The one sets fires that he may gather BOOTY; the other arouses popular distrust that he may retain or acquire POWER. No case has ever arisen in the world where a so called reform was proposed which would injure the man who proposed it.  
We seem now to have subjugated or at least to have set aside our OLD TIME RULES OF LAW AND REASON AND JUSTICE and to have summoned to our seats of power the baser attributes more easily aroused, but harder to subdue.  
The policeman never had so little authority in a crowd as he has today. Our courts of law, the most complete development of civilized society, a shield to the lowly, a check to the proud, are viewed with gradually DIMINISHING RESPECT AND FEAR by those who without the courts would be a menace to the state.  
And this spirit is often fostered and encouraged by those who are chosen and SWORN to administer the laws.



THE IDEAS NOW MOST POPULAR ARE ALSO MOST DANGEROUS. THE CLAMOR IS FOR THE LIMITATION OF FORTUNES, FORGETTING THAT THAT ALSO MEANS THE LIMITATION OF INDUSTRY; FOR THE CURTAILMENT OF THE POWER OF THE COURTS, FORGETTING THAT THAT MEANS DEATH TO THE FREEDOM OF THE INDIVIDUAL; FOR THE EQUALITY OF MEN BY ARBITRARY RULE, FORGETTING THAT THIS MEANS TO CLOG THE INDUSTRIOUS AND HELP THE LAZY.  
The people when they try can raze everything to the ground. THEY MAY UNMAKE OR REMAKE THEIR CONSTITUTION. They may, if they like, abolish their courts and legislatures and take the reins of government directly in their own hands.  
This means REVOLUTION, but are there no precedents for revolution?  
Is there any prophet abroad in these days who can say HOW FAR the people would go in their present temper!
