No part of the Coast country presents a more favorable and inviting appearance to the newcomer from the East than the Estacada country. Our disadvantage lies in the fact that we are at the end of a spur line. If a transcontinental railroad passed thru Estacada, carrying hundreds of people daily looking for new locations and homes, many would be attracted by the country and come here to settle.

The News does not agree with the judgement shown by someone who writes from Estacada to the city and county seat papers raking up old sores, and engendering more. We do not believe much in the policy of permitting people to air their personal troubles through the columns of the newspaper. The little, immaterial differences between persons which are of no moment to the welfare of the community at large have no place in the newspaper. If we would allow such things we could keep very busy in the work. If you have anything good to say of your community, your people, hand it to us, but if you have a personal grievance letter, send it away; foreign publishers print them because they attract attention to their sheets. But the same thing about their home citizens would be accepted reluctantly.

If the railroad company will give the large bunk house back of the hotel and move it onto a lot donated by the City of Estacada, will the people of the city and country vicinity furnish it for a fruit and vegetable cannery? This would be a very easy proposition to carry to a success, and it would be a great, good thing for the country and town.

SCHOOL ELECTION

Estacada Holds a Characteristic Meeting—Result Satisfactory and Good Feelings Prevail

Eightythree votes were cast at Estacada's annual school meeting Monday evening. It was nearly a full vote, and shows that our people take a great interest and delight in local educational affairs, and are inclined to go to the limit in them. Chairman John Stormer called the meeting to order, and John Lovelace read the annual report and the minutes of last year's meeting both of which were approved. Nominations for director were then declared in order. The names of Mr. Stormer and Mr. Page were presented. Mr. Stormer declined to let his name be used, but after it was shown that the people wanted him again he withdrew his objection, and he was unanimously chosen director for another term. For clerk-treasurer, L. E. Belais and J. F. Lovelace were nominated, and the former was elected on a ballot of 27 to 56. It was on the clerkship where the fight centered, and this called out the big crowd. However, the ballot showed it to be very much one-sided. The tax levy was voted at 3 mills, which was based on an assessment of 700,000 dollars. The estimated cost of running the school for the next year is \$3,700. There is at present \$1,000 in the treasury. It was the expressed opinion of the meeting that four teachers should be employed during the next year, and the directors are to use their own judgement in adding more grades to the school, but a meeting will be called in a month to take legal action on the matter. About fifteen ladies took part in the proceedings.

OBITUARY

Diona Currin died at her home at Curriusville June 11, 1908. She was born in Indiana July 12, 1827, making her age at the time of her death 80 years 10 months and 29 days. In early childhood she moved with her parents to Missouri and from there in 1847 the family started across the plains for Oregon leaving behind them there the mother, she having died while preparations for the journey were in progress. In 1849 she married Hugh Currin and four children were born to them of whom three are living, George J., Martha A. Robert V.; the fourth, Hugh, died some years ago. In the family cemetery, by the side of her husband, her remains were laid to rest in the presence of a great number of people. Mrs. Currin was loved by all who knew her, and with a love akin to the love of a mother she loved all who come in contact with her. She has gone and the community feels her departure, but her good works and noble life and character are monuments which will long remain in the memory of the people.
