Clackamas County to Be Divided—Question to Be Voted on At Next Election

### Estacada to Be County Seat

A movement is a foot, and is well under way for the creation of a new county out of the east half of Clackamas. The line of division will be the line between townships 3 and 4, west of Willamette Meridian. The new county will contain about 30 townships, leaving about 16 townships in the old county. "Cascade" is the name which has been suggested for the new county. The creation of a new county out of the east portion of Clackamas is no new scheme. The idea was started and agitated some years ago, but the time is near at hand, for the realization of the proposition. It will be necessary to have the question come up and be voted on by the people of the state at large at the next general election. The county of "Hood River" was created at the last general election in this manner, and the county of Cascade, as proposed, will have nearly three times the area of Hood River. It is thought that the plan for this new county will meet with little or no opposition. This portion of the county is so isolated from the present seat of county government that it will make but very little difference to the West end of the county when the division comes. The portion to be made into a new county has a population and an assessed valuation which will justify its being made into a county. Estacada would be the logical location for the county seat.

On Monday morning E. P. Scott and H. E. Stubbs began work on the Estacada State Bank building. They have a contract with the bank people to repaint their banking house throughout, inside and outside, and also to reparer the interior, and put a hard oil finish on the woodwork. The improvements involves an expenditure of \$217.85. The bank officials say it is their purpose to make the bank building and its appointments throughout as handsome and convenient as possible.

#### Express and Baggage Car

Beginning Wednesday morning the railway company began running an express and baggage car on the Estacada line. The car leaves Estacada with the 7:22 train in the morning, and makes three trips to Portland each day.

This service is intended to take

care of express and baggage. This traffic has increased to such an extent as to require special attention. All fruit, milk, cream and other produce which needs rapid transportation, will be taken on this car. W. G. Telford, who has been in the Estacada station, has been put in charge of the car. C. P. Kelley, of Seattle takes Mr. Telford's position in the station.

#### Working on the Electric Power Plant

The big plant on the Clackamas river a mile above town, where electric power is generated, is already being rapidly repaired. Nearly 30 men were put to work immediately after the insurance was adjusted, and operations will continue until the plant is again completed. Two additional penstocks and two more generators will be installed, which will increase the number to five. Since the accident the railway company has had to start up its old plant in Portland to supply the electricity formerly made at Cazadero, and this is expensive, costing the company from \$12,000 to \$15,000 a month, more than the Clackamas river plant.
