Mr. Upton will at once build a nice home, and move here with his wife and daughter, the latter to attend the high school. The establishing of a high school course here was instrumental in bringing Mr. Upton to Estacada.

Will Enlarge His Warehouse—Has Bought Icehouse

John F. Lovelace, the flour, feed and grain merchant, is going to enlarge his present warehouse. He has purchased of the railway company the building formerly used as an icehouse, and will make it a part of his store. The building stands a few feet west of Mr. Lovelace's warehouse. He has leased the ground on which it stands, and also the ground between the buildings. This will give him a track frontage of 60 feet. Mr. Lovelace expects to cover the ground with a large warehouse at once.

Thetta Stephens Drowns in the Willamette River

Miss Thetta Stephens, aged 20, was thrown into the Willamette river from an overturned rowboat late Sunday night and sank before help could reach her. With a companion, Miss Stephens went out on the river boating Sunday evening. In the darkness their rowboat collided with a passing log raft in the harbor. Their boat was capsized and although the girl's escort did his utmost to reach her and place her on the overturned boat, she sank almost immediately. Miss Stephens was the daughter of D. G. Stephens, who is visiting in England at the present time. She lived at her parents' home on the Columbia Slough road. The body of Miss Stephens was recovered from the river Monday at 4:30 p. m. near the Portland Lumber Co's mill.

Miss Thetta Stephens was a sister of Miss Mae Stephens who has taught in the primary room of the Estacada school the past two years.

KAFFOURY-NORTH CASE

Former Business Associates In Trouble—Mysterious Check

The following news item appeared in the Evening Telegram of July 24: "Ed. Kaffoury has brought suit against H. N. North for \$200. He says that North gave him an undated check for \$200 on the Estacada State Bank, with the understanding that the paper was not to be presented at the bank until a specified time, and that when he turned the check in the bank refused payment on the ground that North had no funds on deposit." In answer to the above Mr. North says that he purchased the 1-10th interest in the firm of Darowish, North & Co. from Ed. Kaffoury for the agreed price of \$250 which was paid by handing Kaffoury checks for \$209 which have been paid

thru Estacada State Bank and are now in possession of Mr. North bearing Kaffoury's receipt thereon, and a board bill of \$41 at H. W. Green's, which North paid for Kaffoury, handing the receipt to the latter.

North says that he never gave Kaffoury a check for \$200 at any time and if Kaffoury holds any such check it is a forgery or has been stolen from Mr. North's check book bearing an unauthorized signature.
