Western Banking Company Buys Timber

The Western Banking Company which comprises Geo. Estes and S. W. Stryker of Portland purchased on the 29th inst., all the fir and cedar timber on the two tracts of land comprising eighty acres owned by David P. Mathews and one hundred and sixty acres owned by the estate of Permal Mathews on the south side of the Clackamas river about a mile from Estacada. The purchasers intend to put a number of wood cutters at work on this tract immediately and cut all the merchantable fir timber into cordwood for the Portland markets. They are paying one dollar per cord for cutting wood and their superintendent E. M. Miller has the immediate charge of the wood cutting and those who desire sub-contracts for cutting wood should apply to Mr. Miller.

The Western Banking Company began operating in Estacada August 1st 1907 and in 14 months from August 1907 to Sept. 30, 1908 they have, according to their books, disbursed \$20,243.00 in wages in Estacada.
