The Portland Commercial Club finished its new building with Oregon or Douglas Fir, and in addition to this used this same exquisitely grained wood in making some high class permanent furniture for its main parlor. Nine out of ten visitors admire it more than they do mahogany. During the visit of Mr. E. H. Harriman he requested that samples be sent him for the consideration of his architects who are now building his country home, which will probably be the finest residence in America. Last Saturday President B. L. Winchell of the Rock Island System made a visit to the Club and particularly admired this same wood. He gave notice to an official of the Harriman Lines who was present that if they didn't hurry the Rock Island would have the first dining car or sleeper finished in the chief wood of the Pacific Northwest of which there is sufficient yet left to turn out more and richer millionaires than has the iron and steel district of which Pittsburg is the center.

A meeting of the representatives of all the Pacific Coast commercial bodies will be held in San Francisco on Monday, October 5th. There will be delegates in attendance from several of the important organizations of Washington and Oregon. On Tuesday morning opens in the same city for a five days session, the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress, which gives promise of being one of the most resultful gatherings of that influential body. Delegates from Washington and Oregon are materially increased by the fact that the Congress has held meetings in both Portland and Seattle.

The Grange fair and festival to be held at Gresham Oct. 6 to 10, should and no doubt will be well attended by all from this and adjoining districts. Ranchers as well as other lines of business should be eager for the self improvement to be obtained at these exhibits of skill and labor, as well as to enjoy the social and entertaining qualities of these local displays. Vancouver, Washington, one of the old pioneer towns made famous by having General Grant and General Sherman located at the Barracks there; is giving some of the newer towns a sample of civic enterprise. Not satisfied with putting down hard-surfaced pavements, on last Saturday they celebrated the completion of an electric street railway system which reaches well into the suburbs.

The Columbia River, Crater Lake and other famous scenic attractions of the North Pacific Coast he says have no equal.
