FATHER OF MRS. H. A. WILLIAMS LAID TO REST.

Another Concrete Building for Estacada

On Friday of last week, T. Yocum brought to Estacada the county rock crusher and the same was set up at the site of the proposed new concrete building, to be erected next to the Estacada State Bank. Saturday the crusher was in operation crushing rock. On Monday a force of about twelve to fifteen men was put upon the building by J. W. Reed. The building to be erected is to be made of concrete. It has a frontage of fifty feet on Broadway and extends back the depth of the lot, one hundred feet with an extension fronting on Second street twenty-five by thirty-five feet at the rear of the bank. The ground floor contains five thousand eight hundred and seventy-five square feet which will enable the occupants of the room commodious quarters and certainly add a good store to Estacada. It is generally supposed that it will be occupied as a department store, but the promoters so far have not revealed their identity. It is certain however that the structure in itself will be quite an acquisition to the city's business buildings. Since the above was in type we have learned the building is being put up by an incorporated Co., of which A. E. Sparks, Chas. E. DuBoise, J. W. Reed, W. F. and R. W. Cary are the incorporators.

Clerk Greenman Makes His Report

COST OF OPERATING AFFAIRS OF CLACKAMAS FOR SIX MONTHS IS \$100,728.72.

The cost of operating the affairs of Clackamas County during the six months ending September 30 was \$100,728.72. This information is embraced in the semi-annual report of County Clerk Greenman. The general expense was \$27,599.11 the largest item being \$51,32.89 for elections, which will not be included in the expense next year. Roads and bridges during the

half-year cost Clackamas County \$73,169.61.
