Estacada's First Hold-up

C. P. KELLY, THE O. W. P. TICKET AND FREIGHT AGENT SAND BAGGED

Estacada experienced the sensation of a hold-up on Saturday evening last, just after the car, that arrives here from Portland at about eight o'clock, had left the depot. Mr. Kelly, Express-messenger Telford, John Jones and Millard Sarver were all in the depot for a couple of minutes after the car had started for Cazadero. The three men left almost at the same time, leaving Kelly alone. Before going away John Jones had noticed an express package that had arrived for his brother Tom, and after going over to the Jones' livery barn and returning to the livery shop, where he found Tom coming out of the shop, said to him there was a package at the depot for him and that they had better go over and get it, which they started to do. John taking the lead and Tom following close by, John was the first to enter the depot and as he did so discovered Kelly lying in front of the office and close to where the ticket window is placed. Thinking that Kelly was playing a joke on him he made some remark to Kelley and at that instance Tom came in and also said that they would take the "Irishman" out. John then raised Kelly up and saw the blood stains on his shirt and face and said to Tom that Kelly was bad hurt and not joking. Kelley at this time was not able to stand when placed upon his feet. John immediately raised the alarm and several persons came in to assist. They placed Kelly in the office and in a short time he was able to explain that some one had been standing close to the ticket window and as he left his office and went through the door, a couple of feet, he was struck down. The Jones brothers had discovered that Kelly's pockets had all been turned wrong side out and that his keys were lying on the floor. It is thought that not more than ten minutes had elapsed from the time Kelly had been left alone until the return of John and Tom Jones, for the car did not return from Cazadero until they had found Kelly and had been working with him for some little time; it only requires about fifteen minutes to make the trip. Kelly was taken to his home and the rail-road officials at Portland notified. The rear door to the freight room was found to be partly open and on going outside an empty pocket book was found lying on the ground, this proved to be the one used by Kelly. The exact amount of money taken is not definitely stated by Mr. Kelly but it is generally spoken of as being close to fifty dollars. Some tracks were discovered, as if some one had ran from the rear door in the direction of the park, on Sunday morning, but no definite clue is given as to who the perpetrator of the dastardly crime was, or how many were concerned in the hold up.

It is stated the railroad officials have a clue that is being worked out but we were not informed as to what it was.

The point at which Kelly was struck down was well chosen by the foot pad, as access is easily gained and one might remain there some time unobserved at that particular time of night as few passengers are in waiting for this particular car. It is to be hoped that the guilty one will be found out.
