If the conference of Pacific Coast commercial bodies held in San Francisco the past week had resulted in nothing more than its action regarding national conventions, the meeting would have been one of the most important, viewed from the standpoint of the development of Oregon, Washington and their sister states, ever called. It was unanimously agreed by the delegates in attendance that the Coast should act as a unit in working to secure such conventions, each city endorsing the invitation of the others, with each of course to have a fair population.

Active publicity work has resulted in such an influx of people in the more active communities of the Pacific Northwest that housing the newcomers has really become a serious problem in some of the towns. New residences are being erected as rapidly as possible, and rented long in advance of their completion. In some of the fruit districts, cars loaded with household goods are occupying the tracks and the delay in their unloading is making the orchardists apprehensive as to trackage for their fruit shipments.

The roses for which the North Pacific Coast is so famous are blooming with almost the freedom and perfection of early summer, and the approach of Autumn has added to their coloring. The Portland Commercial Club has resumed the decoration of its tables with flowers furnished by different members, the display being the subject of much comment by Eastern visitors in particular.

Rev. Herbert Frank Moulton, of Biddeford, Maine, one of the best known lecturers in the country, is featuring his lecture on the Pacific Northwest, and the Oregon Development League, in connection with the commercial bodies of Washington, has furnished illustrating slides of extraordinary attractiveness.

Through a telegram received from Indianapolis, where the National Association of Funeral Directors have just closed their session, comes the news that this association has chosen Portland for its 1909 convention, the Alaska-Youkon-Pacific Exposition being one of the factors in making this decision.

In this issue will be found a vindication of Atty. Geo. C. Brownell. This paper at all times will be glad to give the true conditions as it finds them.

It is with great pleasure that I write to you and say as a matter of justice to you, that during my connection with the Department of the Interior as Special Inspector of the Interior Department at Portland, Oregon, I had occasion, together with other members of the Government Service, to make a thorough investigation of the charges that had been made by several individuals, including political enemies, of your alleged connection with what has been commonly known as the Oregon land frauds, and that after having made a most thorough investigation, I as well as other representatives of the Government, became thoroughly convinced that you are innocent of any violation of the land laws, and in no way connected or involved in the Oregon land frauds.

**Wagon Is Hurlled By Car**

Into Bay

Driver, Badly Injured Is Barely Rescued From Awful Death.

Struck by a swiftly-speeding street car, a wagon belonging to the Empire Laundry Co. and driven by A. Maddock was hurled off the bridge at Seattle boulevard and Massachusetts St. last night, into the waters of the bay. The accident happened about eight o'clock. Maddock was badly injured. He was rescued from his perilous position, where death from drowning or the heels of the frightened horses threatened him, and removed to the Seattle General Hospital, where it is reported this morning that his condition is critical.

The car was No. 342, in charge of Conductor E. Weller and Motorman A. D. Harley.  
The supposition is that Maddock drove down Massachusetts St. and attempted to cross the track in front of the car. Harley saw the wagon suddenly lurch ahead but a few feet. He applied the brakes, but the car and wagon met with terrific force and the lighter vehicle was literally thrown off the bridge, dragging the horses after it. The tide was low there being but three or four feet

of water beneath the bridge at the time. The fall was about twelve feet. The horses struggled in the tangle of harness and wreckage and managed to pull themselves into an upright position.

A derrick was quickly rigged up and the horses and wreck of the wagon were raised to the street. The accident was reported to the police.

In the above clipping the driver of the laundry wagon was given as A. Maddock. This is an error in name as he is a brother of Mrs. M. G. Richards of our city. Maddock is the proper name. We are informed that he is quite seriously injured and Mrs. Richards certainly has the sympathy of the community in her double affliction, which is a verification of the saying, "Trouble never comes singly."
