### Expend \$2,000,000 For System

Improvements For Next Year By the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co.

President Josselyn announces that the directors of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company have authorized extensive improvements in their Portland properties during the coming year. These include the following: Increase of voltage of the Cazadero transmission line from 10,000 volts to 30,000, and increasing the capacity of that station to 22,000 horsepower, by the installation of 5500 horsepower more; additional machinery and apparatus for Substation A, at Seventh and Alder streets; consolidated shops for the broad and narrow gauge lines; additional freight and passenger cars; carbarns at Sellwood; reconstruction of some of the lines and new extensions in city and suburbs; additional paving; installing underground system of conduited wires in the business district. This latter item will involve the expenditure of \$1,000,000. The contract for placing the conduites has been let to W. S. Barstow & Co., of New York, for \$750,000, and it is the intention to complete the improvement by September, 1909. The estimated cost of all improvements will be about

### M. E. Congregation Decides To Complete Parsonage

WILL PUSH THE BUILDING TO COMPLETION AS RAPIDLY AS POSSIBLE

The Methodist Episcopal congregation has decided to go ahead at once and complete the parsonage the start of which was made immediately on the completion of the church. An unusual grant was made by the board of church extension in donating two hundred dollars toward building a parsonage. This money has been ready for almost a year if the congregation could have placed themselves in a position to receive it, a condition of which is that they complete the building free of debt by a given time. The offer of this two hundred will expire on the 7th of November and if not applied for will revert back to the Society. Consequently the trustees got busy all at once and decided that it was imperative that they build in order to save this donation, so badly needed. They agree to complete the building free of debt by August 1, 1909.

It will be decided at a meeting of the board to be called soon as to the kind of a house to build. The foundation dimensions are thirty-two by thirty two. It will likely be two stories high. So this will give additional work to our people as well as add one more building to our little city. The need of a parsonage can readily be seen by anyone. Of course the congregation can compel their minister to pay rent but the sooner they own their own home for him the better it will be for all concerned.
