The Wood Factory Sold and Resumes Operation

The wood factory has again been sold, J. W. Reed, A. E. Sparks, T. Yocum, who have for some time been owners of the wood factory sold their interest in the same to the Western Lumber and Fuel Co. The transfer being made last Thursday. W. D. Hayes, who has been foreman of construction for the Wind River Lumber Co. at Cazadero, has been secured as foreman for the factory. He brought with him Dixon Amos, an expert mill-man, who is familiar with all the details of a wood manufacturing plant. On Monday morning the men commenced cleaning up about the factory and getting it in readiness to manufacture all kinds of finished lumber including mouldings, flooring, siding &c. It is not the intention to make doors or windows at present at least. Teams commenced hauling lumber from the Western Lumber Co's mill North of the city on Tuesday. It is expected to have the factory working at once with a small force of workmen which will be increased as the occasion demands. It is the intention of the new owners to produce a high grade of manufactured lumber for Pacific Coast as well as Eastern points. If it is found that cross arms for telephone and telegraph as well as other cross arms used for electrical purposes can be profitably manufactured, the cross arms, m'g. machinery will be at once put in operation. All this ought to be glad news to all residents. Labor as well as business interests, merchants, ranchers, and in fact all classes of society ought to be glad to hear the busy wheels of machinery and the thrill of the steam whistle in our midst. For while many communities have plenty of idle men, Estacada is furnishing work to all who ask for it; and the "knocker" is having a hard time to find something to find fault with.

The DuBoise Lumber Co's Mill Goes Up In Smoke.

IT IS SUPPOSED TO BE THE WORK OF AN INCENDIARY.

About four o'clock on Wednesday morning fire was discovered at the mill of the DuBoise Lumber Co. by Chas. E. DuBoise. He at once gave the alarm and secured the help employed about the mill to assist him. Word was immediately sent to Estacada for help and was generously responded to by all persons hearing of the fire. By retaining his presence of mind and quick work done on the part of Chas. E. DuBoise saved to the DuBoise Lumber Co. at least six thousand dollars worth of additional property that was in great danger of destruction. As it is, the loss to this company is a severe blow. This enterprise has sprung up practically since the laying out of the city. It had many struggles through its early development and it is to the credit of Chas. E. DuBoise who has been its manager, that the company has been placed upon the sound business basis it occupied at the time this catastrophe came upon them. I am informed by Mr. DuBoise that while it has been a great loss to the company, that his Co. is worth at least sixteen thousand dollars yet and that it will proceed immediately to erect a new mill on the site of the destroyed one. The property loss to the DuBoise Lumber Co. is ten thousand dollars. Nine thousand on the mill and machinery and one thousand on lumber. This loss is total as no insurance was carried.
