Traveling Library in Estacada

The state has prepared several libraries, made up of some of the best books of all times, for the use of the different parts of the state. These libraries consist of from fifty to sixty books, suitable for old and young, boys and girls; for the school or the community. All that the state requires of any town, school district, or organization wishing one of the traveling libraries, as they are called, is that they shall pay the freight on the books to and from Salem and also replace any book that has been unnecessarily injured or destroyed. The books can be kept six months and when they are returned another library will be sent upon the same conditions.

There will be one of these libraries in the school house as soon as the State Library Commission can send one. It will be open to all after four o'clock. Perhaps their will be something good that you have not read. By all means encourage your boys and girls to read. Have them bring some of the books home. The teachers will do all they can to inculcate a taste for good reading and to encourage the children to read but they cannot do everything without the help of the parents. The long evenings of the coming season and the rainy days are the times when we need the best company. There is none better than good books. Let the wind howl and the rain beat against the windows what does one mind that when they have a companion who never fails; always ready to talk to you, always ready to make you forget the world without.

Encourage your boys to read good books such as will be found in this library for with a good library one may gain as liberal an education as in a university. Our lives are determined by the books we read. This is especially true of boys. Young Lincoln and many others who have done things of worth in this world never attended college but they mastered every good book that came within their reach. Some of them did not have the study lamp of the modern boy either but they read by the fitful firelight. You can tell what a young fellow is going to become by knowing these two things about him: whether he reads or not and what he reads.

You need never be afraid that your boy or girl is in bad company, forming bad habits, spending their time worthless or aimlessly, if they have a good book in their hands; for in good books are all the treasures of the past, all the thoughts of the great spirits that shaped history, made inventions, builded noble characters and struggled through poverty to greatness such companion ship will plant seeds of thought and inspiration that will make for noble manhood and womanhood.

Bacon said, "Some books are to be tasted, others to be swallowed, and some few to be chewed and digested." Many of the so-called books of our times better called trash should not even be tasted and one of the objects of this traveling library is to teach young people the difference between good and poor books, to give them a taste for the best, and to furnish them with books that may be "chewed and digested."

Lowell says, "The riches of scholarship, the benignities of literature, defy fortune and outlive calamity. They are beyond the reach of thief or moth or rust. As they cannot be inherited, so they cannot be alienated. But they may be shared, they may be distributed, and it is the object and office of a free public library to perform these functions."
