The new concrete building is taking on more the appearance of a substantial business block every day. The heavy beams are being placed in position this week. We are informed that it will require about two months yet to complete the work.

For this purpose he has specially arranged a "Welcome Church Service" to be conducted at the usual hour of 11 a. m. Let each member and friend of the church make an effort to see "The stranger within our gates" and make them welcome to these services.

Evangelist Sewall, who has been holding a series of meetings in the old schoolhouse has been very successful in his work. A number of persons have united with the church and nine converts have been baptized. No services were held on Tuesday evening as the evangelist was called to attend the funeral of a brother minister, Rev. Richey, who is well known in this community.

Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition

(Special Correspondence to the Progress) Seattle, Wash., Nov. 11.—The sale of \$350,000 worth of exposition bonds has removed the last obstacle to the success of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition and it is now certain that the 1909 fair will have the distinction of being the first big exposition to be entirely completed in time for the opening date. The progress that is being made on the construction of the buildings and grounds is a guarantee that no detail will be left unfinished when the fair is formally opened June 1, 1909.

When it was announced that an additional \$350,000 was required to carry on the work outlined by the exposition management the people of Seattle responded promptly to the call for funds and the entire amount was subscribed within a week after the actual canvass was commenced. With this additional fund on hand the management of the exposition took immediate steps to enlarge the scope of construction.

Already three of the permanent buildings are finished and are ready to be turned over to the University of Washington at the close of the fair. By the first of the new year the fourth permanent building will be completed and a number of the temporary structures finished. The mining palace and the fisheries building and the hospital and fire station are in use and the Oregon building, the first state building to be completed, is ready to receive exhibits. Oregon will begin the shipment of its exhibits about January 1. The first consignment will be 3,000 boxes of apples, which will be placed in the cold storage plant, in the basement of the Oregon building, until within a few weeks of the opening date.

Remarkable progress has been made on the construction of the California state building and this structure will be completed not later than January 1. Work has been commenced on the Washington state building, which is to be one of the permanent structures to be turned over to the University at the close of the fair.

The plans for the United States government building have been approved and the contract for the construction will be awarded in about ten days.

Work on the grounds is in excellent shape. The site of 250 acres has been entirely cleared and graded and roads and paths laid out. Acres of green lawns give refreshing appearance and the mild climate of Puget Sound will make it possible to transplant a great many of the more hardy flowers during the winter months. There are in all about a million plants in the green houses and when these are set out and in bloom the grounds will be a veritable mass of beautiful flowers, clinging vines and green shrubbery.

An Educational Rally

HELD IN ESTACADA ON TUESDAY EVENING

The Methodist Episcopal Church was filled to overflow on Tuesday evening to listen to what County Superintendent Gary was pleased to call an "Educational Rally." There was some delay in starting as persons on the first part of the program were detained by practice on the program for the following day, for the Rebekah Convention. Mrs. H. A. Williams opened the evenings entertainment with a vocal solo, "Lullaby," accompanied by Mrs. Dr. Adix on the organ, which was well received by the assembly. Mr. L. E. Belfils on the cornet, accompanied by Mrs. Dr. Adix on the organ, rendered "The Song that Touched My Heart," in his accustomed and pleasing manner. Supt. Gary at this stage in the program announced his very great pleasure at being able to again an-

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notice a school drill by the pupils of the primary grade, when a number of little girls with dolls came forward and gave the drill, under the direction of their teacher, Miss Mae Stephens. Supt. Gary made a brief address outlining his purpose in calling these meetings which he describes as being experimental and that in only one other state in the Union did he know of any such meetings being held; that being Wisconsin. Its objects being to get the three great educational factors, the home, the school and the teacher, in closer touch for the best results obtainable. State Supt. J. H. Ackerman was then introduced and made statements along educational lines. Sanctioning the experiment of County Supt. Gary in his effort to raise the standard of education, Complimenting our little city schools At the same time assuring us that we should have more pupils in our high school course. The remarks of the State Supt. were listened to with marked attention because of their practical worth to parent, pupil, and teacher.

The third District Convention of Dist. 2. Opened at 11:30. The convention was called to order by Gertrude Morrow N. G. Mrs. J. W. Reed Chairman of Convention being unable to attend the N. G. introduced Mrs. Stuart, Past Pres. of the Assembly who had been ap. to conduct this Convention in absence of Mary Smith, President, who is ill. Mrs. Cook, of Willamette Lodge Oregon City, was then nominated and elected Chairman for the day and Miss G. Morrow Vice Chairman. Mrs. Wissenger Con. Mrs. Clifford, Warden, Mrs. W. Vonce I. G. The minutes of last Con. read and approved. At the roll call of lodges in Dist. 2 all were represented except Shamrock No. 113 and Lentz Rebekah Lodge. The remainder of the morning session was spent in discussing lodge business. Lodge adjourning till 2 p. m. Lunch was served in Portland Restaurant.

The DuBoise Lumber Co. is busy these days cleaning up and getting ready to at once commence the reconstruction of their burned mill. A machinist of Portland came out last week to make an examination of the burned machinery and ascertain the requirements for the reconstructed mill. The mill will be of greater capacity than ever. In addition to the regular planer that was in the mill a four side high grade machine planer will be installed. It is the intention of the Co. to manufacture all kinds of mouldings, and finished lumber. To keep in stock everything that enters into the construction of a building, including shingles. A banister machine will also be an addition to the new mill. It is expected it will require about three months to replace the mill.

Most of the election bets and forfeitures on the election in this community have been paid for, except D. F. Warners', the enthusiastic democrat, ranch owner, and general utility man about the Estacada Hotel, who wagered an oyster and turkey dinner to take place at the Estacada Hotel. We have no doubt about the dinner being served as we know the democrat, who pinned his faith to Bryan, personally and we have always found him ready with the goods when the time came.

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
