Interest in the joint meeting of the State Horticultural Society and the Northwest Fruitgrowers' Association is universal throughout this part of the United States and British Columbia. The State Association holds a convention in Portland Tuesday, December 1st.—this is followed by two days' meeting of the Northwest Association. Convention and exhibit will occupy two floors of the Woodmen's Hall, Eleventh and Alder Streets. A night session will be held in the Convention Room on Tuesday, and a reception will be tendered to the delegates to both conventions on Thursday evening, December 3rd, by the Portland Commercial Club from 8 to 11 o'clock. The prizes for this show are very much the most valuable ever offered and an enormous attendance is anticipated.

The Oregon State Dairy Association has been recognized by the Agricultural Department at Washington, D. C., and assurance is given that Government experts will participate in the convention on December 10th and 11th at Salem. A rate of a fair and a third for the round trip has been made from all points in this State.

The Albany Apple Fair occupied the center of the stage in Oregon activities last week. Albany gave Portland, Eugene and Salem an object lesson in entertaining that it will take these cities a long time to equal. The town is growing and building hard surface pavements, while apples shown were equal to the best.

The TIMBERMAN is advocating a Logging Congress at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition to be held at Seattle next year. We can readily see the importance to one of our great industries, such a congress would be and the TIMBERMAN is devoting a part of its space to a very worthy cause.

Klickitat County's citizens joined in a monster optimistic rally at White Salmon, Washington, last Saturday. Expert publicity men and railroad officials were present from Portland to take part in the event, which was one of the most successful ever held in the "Ever-green State."

Crowds are meeting the farming demonstration train at every station. Through the co-operation of the Oregon Agricultural College and railroad interest which have made this possible, lots of good is being done towards the encouragement of diversified and intelligent farming.

Goldendale, Washington, has given all the communities of the Pacific Coast a record in raising money for advertising purposes, by giving \$2.00 for every man, woman and child within the city limits, or a total of \$1500.00, and this came in at the rate of \$125 a minute.

Albany did not allow the people of Portland or the other valley cities and towns to forget the Albany Apple Fair and the dedication of the new Southern Pacific depot on Tuesday, November 10th. Portland was there with a thoroughly representative delegation.

In line with the general railroad development of this Northwestern country was the completion of the railroad from Elgin to Enterprise, which affords an easy market for the Walkova Valley. The final terminus will be Joseph.

No more interesting talk was ever made for the Portland Ad Club than the address delivered by Dr. W. T. Williamson on "Suggestion of the chief force in advertising." Members and their friends filled the hall.
