The 20 premium boxes of apples purchased by the Portland Commercial Club will go five boxes each to King Edward of England, Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany, Czar Nicholas of Russia, and President Fallieres of France, after being exhibited in Macy's show windows in New York. The Pacific Northwest is going to carry off important prizes at the National Horticultural Congress in Council Bluffs, Iowa, December 14th to 19th if united efforts count for anything.

One of the most enjoyable trips yet made by the Portland Realty Board was to Vancouver, Washington, on the 28th. They went by trolley and returned by the Spokane Portland & Seattle Railway, over the famous bridges which span the Columbia and Willamette. The really men were royally entertained.

A premium list superior to any offered before is being circulated for the approaching Oregon State Dairy Association's Convention at Salem December 10th and 11th. Particularly handsome cups are a feature of the prizes. Correspondence indicates an attendance larger than ever before.

Cazadero Power Plant Again in First Class Shape

REMARKABLE AMOUNT OF REPAIR WORK DONE IN SHORT SPACE OF TIME
MANY NEW GENERATORS INSTALLED

On June 21st the power plant of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company located at Cazadero was wrecked. On Tuesday it was our privilege, through the courtesy of Mr. Al. Drill, to make a tour through the reconstructed plant and find all their machinery in fine working order, and much better than before the accident. The last new machine having been just installed. To those who were permitted to view the wreck and witnessed the destruction made in the short space of time, will realize the amount of labor and expense to the company, necessary to replace the plant. Considering that these machines must be built to order and be transferred over three thousand miles and placed in position is to the credit of the Co. that the work was so speedily done. On July 10 temporary machinery was placed in position and the plant started. On July 31, generator number 3, purchased from the Japanese Government was installed. It was made by the General Electric Co., Schenectady, N. Y. November 13th generator number 1 and November 29th, number 2 were placed in working order and the company is now considering bids for an additional machine of sixty cycles. The original plant contained three, 2500 K. W., 33 cycle machines. The plant now contains two 33 and one 60 cycle generators each having 2500 K. W. and the same number of transformers as before. The change in the generators from the ones in the original plant necessitates the use of one line for the 60 cycle generator and another for the 33 cycle generator. The two 33 cycle generators were made by the Allis Chalmers Co., Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Mr. Wm. J. Dawson of Ashland, Mass. representing the Lombard Governor Co., of the same place is an expert in his line sent here by his Co. to install the generators in perfect working order. He has been at the plant since the middle of August and will likely remain two weeks longer. This Co. has three hydraulic relief valves on the pen-stocks for the purpose of preventing water hammer. All the machinery seems to run much smoother and with less noise than did the ones before the wreck. There are three switch block tenders and three water wheel tenders required for the twenty-four hours run. Divided into three shifts with one switch block and one water-wheel tender to each shift. In addition to these men a machinist and an extra man to take places, when necessary, constitute the working force, necessary to run the plant. Regular forms of record are kept by the men on the different shifts as to stages of water, power generated, and used and several other items the technicality of which the writer is unfamiliar with, but all go to show the care taken to prevent accident and to record the money making power of the plant. We endeavored to reach the proper officials of the Co. by phone to ascertain the probable cost to reconstruct the plant, but the phone was not in working order and we are unable to give any figures as to its cost. LATER—We are in possession of additional information which we will print regarding the plant, next week.
