Work is progressing nicely on the proposed new site for the new power plant. New roads have been made to the river bank and the houses from the Bowen camp torn down and have been rebuilt on the bank of the river near the site of the new dam. These will be used for the accommodation of the men employed on the construction work. A force of civil engineers have been steadily employed the past couple of weeks with preliminary work.

The parsonage for the new M. E. Church has been put under way, first by erecting a wood shed on the lots. This is so that the lumber and material may, as much as possible, be kept dry. Some work has been done on the building proper, but on account of the men being busy at present, it has not been advanced as far as was expected. Northwestern Fruit Grower's Association Hold Meeting in Portland

The Northwestern Fruit Growers Association held its annual meeting in Portland, Dec. 1 to 5. In connection with its meetings it held a remarkable exhibit of fruit. The entries from Hood River, Oregon, comprising about one-half of the apples there, carried off the majority of prizes, due largely to their superior packing. Any apple in one of their boxes, was of practically the same size and color of its neighbor, while in boxes sent from other parts of the state, this careful selection had not been practiced.

Perhaps the most instructive exhibit was that of the Oregon Agricultural College. One-half showed the advantage of cross pollination, while the other gave typical examples of the same variety from other parts of the country and state.

There was one plate with a dozen Newton Pippins that were self-pollinated, that is a paper bag was tied over the blossoms so that no pollen from another variety could reach them. These apples were about the size of a twenty-five cent piece, although the apples from the same tree but which were cross-pollinated, were of a normal size. The same thing was illustrated with a number of other varieties, showing the advantage of planting two or three varieties in a commercial orchard.

The College had sent to the Experimental Stations in several states for typical specimens of some of the standard apples. These were shown along side of the same kind of apples from Oregon, and in every case the Western apples were far superior to the Eastern ones in appearance particularly in color. The Eastern apple was dull, never attaining the brilliant colors of those grown in Oregon.

In several varieties the Willamette Valley outshone Hood River and Rogue River Valleys, particularly in the Newton Pippins, which were green from the latter two valleys, but were a fine, rich yellow when grown in the Willamette.

One came away from the exhibit convinced that when Western Oregon growers give the same care in growing and particularly in grading and packing their fruit, as do those of Hood River, they will turn out as fine a quality as the latter do.
