Real Estate Transfer

It is not often we have the privilege of recording a real estate transaction where the profits have been so great as it is our privilege to record in the case of Ed. In the course of a few years he sold the timber on the tract to J. D. Forbes, who at that time had a big wood contract, for the sum of fifty dollars, thereby doubling his original investment and retaining the land. On Dec. 10th Mr. Hunt sold this same tract of 8 6-10 acres to the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. for three thousand dollars all of which proves the ascertainment made by the PROGRESS that right at our very door-steps lie the opportunities of increasing our wealth if we will but take advantage of them. Case Against Al. Close Dismissed

The trial of Al. Close for violating a city ordinance, brought in the name of the city by the mayor was tried before Recorder Johnson on Tuesday. Geo. C. Brownell the defendants lawyer being engaged with another case, Gordon H. Hayes another well known lawyer of ability, from Oregon City, came to try the case. From the commencement of the case it was to be seen that the case was largely to be fought on technical points of law, and not on the merits of the case. The prosecution produced three witnesses who testified that they had secured what they called whiskey but which they had purchased under some different name. They here rested their case and the defense moved to dismiss the case for want of evidence to prove that the city had a legal ordinance against selling liquors, by their failure to prove the signatures of the then acting Recorder and Mayor. After several legal tilts between council in reference to points of law Judge Johnson sustained the motion to dismiss the case and the defendant was discharged and his bond released.
