Death of Voyle E. Dick

YOUNG MAN IN PRIME OF LIFE DIED LAST FRIDAY

It is with regret we are again called upon to write of death in our little city. Death is at all times mysterious, and comes as Holy writ informs us "as a thief in the night," so unexpected and quietly, so it was in the case of Voyle E. Dick. A young man of much promise and the pride of fond parents and an only child. He had completed a business course at the State Business College at Tacoma, Washington, before his parents moved to Garfield last April. It was largely that he might be benefited that he came into this community. He had been troubled with valvular heart trouble ever since he was twelve years of age and had to take great care of himself on this account. Since moving to Garfield he had become a member of the Garfield Grange. About two weeks ago while engaged with others at the Grange in jumping, he received a bad fall but of which he did not complain, not even telling his parents of it. It only became known to them after his death. Mr. G. E. Dick recently sold his ranch and moved his household goods to Estacada for the purpose of storing them until his future plans were arranged. It was while on his way here with the goods that he was taken ill. They stopped with Mr. John Tracy for a short time until his father could arrange and have him removed to where they were to store the goods. Dr. Adix was called and he requested the parents to bring another doctor for consultation, and Doctor Gilbert from Portland was sent for. All that could be done was tried but he only lived a short time. It should be stated that Dr. Adix's diagnosis of the case was correct Septic Endocarditis is the professional term used by the doctor. It was early Friday morning that the death messenger came, ending the young life before opportunity gave him time to put into execution the preparation for which he had made. He had recently worked some in the Lion Clothing Store at Portland but most of his time since April was spent on the ranch. Nineteen years and three months was his exact age. The funeral services were conducted from his late residence on Tuesday at ten o'clock, as Mrs. McLenn, a sister of Mr. G. E. Dick, from Fresno, California, did not arrive until late Monday afternoon. The Garfield Grange had charge of the services, the church services being at Mt. Zion Church and Rev. H. W. Kuhlman, pastor, the minister in charge.

Consolidation of Portland and Estacada Companies

The Western Lumber & Fuel Company, which is the corporation that owns and operates the saw mill on Wade Creek and the factory in Estacada, and has been employing a number of wood cutters here for sometime past, has effected a consolidation with the Portland Fuel Company, whereby both corporations will come under one general charter, and will operate in Portland and Estacada as the Western Lumber & Fuel Company which by this combination becomes a corporation with a capital stock of fifty thousand dollars.

The properties of the consolidated companies in Portland, are located at the east end of the Morrison Street Bridge, and comprises offices large yards and docks on the river, barges, twelve teams and wagons for city delivery, and machinery for conducting its business.

Mr. Estes, President and Manager of the company in Estacada, becomes President and Manager of the consolidated companies, and will have his office in Portland at 287 East Morrison Street, and will divide his time between Portland and Estacada.

Dr. S. W. Stryker, of Portland becomes Vice President of the consolidated companies. Geo. A. Steel who is Treasurer of the State of Oregon, is Treasurer and M. V. Sutherland is Secretary.

The Portland company expends about \$5,000 per month for cord wood, besides purchasing large quantities of hay and grain for its teams.

Mr. Estes says that it is the purpose of the consolidated companies to throw the expenditure of this large sum of money to Estacada just as soon as forces can be organized here to supply the large quantity of material handled by the Portland plant.
