SMARTER THAN SHE LOOKS

A great many dairymen, before
beginning to milk, feed each cow.
The milker hurries to get through,
because if the cow finishes her
meal before the milker has done his
work, she extorts more feed by
holding back her milk, so must be
fed again to keep her in good hu-
mor. It is a better plan to do the
milking first and then feed immedi-
ately, and cows that are accustomed
to this treatment generally give
down their milk cheerfully, for they
know that milking is a prelude to
feeding. A cow is much smarter
than she looks, and more grateful
than most persons would believe.
So long as the cows know they are
not going to be struck or beaten,
they will neither kick nor hook.
An experienced milkman will never
allow any loud talking or excite-
ment about his barn or stable, for
the quieter the cows are kept the
greater the quantity of milk given,
and the easier the work is perform-
ed.—January Farm Journal.

DEATH OF AN OLD RES- IDENT OF GARFIELD AT SANDY

Samuel I. Eakin, a well known
and former old time resident of
Garfield was found dead in bed
about eight o'clock on Saturday
evening last at Johnson's logging
camp near Sandy. Mr. Eakin was
employed at the camp and had at-
tended to his work during the day
and gone to his bunk house about
six o'clock in the evening. About
two hours afterwards someone went
to the bunk house and found him
lying on the bed dead, with a paper
lying on his breast where it had
fallen. Evidently when death came
he was lying in bed reading and
smoking a pipe, as the pipe was
in his hand when he was found. The
body was removed to Gresham and
embalmed, to await the arrival of
his sons who reside in Eastern Ore-
gon. Mr. Eakin is survived by
two sons, Bert and Fred, his wife,
who was Fanny Bullard, and daugh-
ter, Ida having preceded him to
the grave about three years ago.
The funeral will take place at
Gresham on Friday at twelve o'clock.

GOVERNMENT RIVER AND WEATHER OB- SERVER IN TOWN

N. S. L. Laurry who has been
the official river and weather
observer in Estacada has been re-
appointed. Mr. Laurry has two
river gauges in the Clackamas. The
one he takes measurements from as
to the stage of the river twice a day
morning and evening. The other
is an automatic river gauge and
only needs to be looked after once
a week as it makes a record every
half hour and must be supplied with
paper once a week. Also a gauge
to measure the rain fall is placed on
the lawn of the Estacada Hotel.
The official measurement of the de-
pth of snow in Estacada Thursday
morning was nine inches. We
have no doubt many persons will be
surprised to learn that we have a
regular salaried government river
and weather observer in our little
city and have had for over a year.
We presume the reason why Mr.
Laurry has been so quiet about it
is that he did not care to take the
blame of common every day weather-
er, but this "unusual" Estacada
snow storm was too much for him
and he had to make himself known
and that he was in the weather
business.

Owing to the fact that the P. R.
L. & P. Co. did not run their freight
to Estacada during the storm, our
paper order did not get in until the
mail car Friday morning, thus put-
ting us to a great deal of inconve-
nience and delaying our issue.
