Mrs. L. C. Parker and daughter Miss Florence arrived in Estacada from Los Angeles, Cal., on Monday to find an unusual condition of weather existing here. We can assure them by our experience and that of the oldest inhabitants that it is unusual.

R. A. Stratton in renewing his subscription says "I am certainly pleased to note your progress." We desire to say our little city is forging ahead and if Mr. Stratton and his family get tired living in Utah he will always find a hearty welcome in Estacada.

The number and kind of conveyances seen in Estacada these stormy days on runners certainly will be impressed on the minds and especially the young, in such a manner that the future residents of our city will be able to produce memory pictures of a once famous snow storm in Oregon when by common consent roses should have been blooming to enlighten future generations.

An old resident sends us this information. The conveyances at the funeral of Mr. Crawford were sleds and sleighs. This is the first time such a thing has happened here since Dec. 7, 1873 when Mrs. Harriett, wife of Seth Palmateer, a pioneer of fifty-two, was buried from the ranch where Mr. E. L. Wagoner now resides, in a cemetery north of Mrs. Sarah Palmateer's. Sleds were used and the lanes were drifted so full of snow that they could not be used and it was necessary to go through the fields.

One round trip of the car leaving Estacada at 2:45 was annulled on Wednesday, also the car that lays here over night went on the "buns" Wednesday p. m. and a new car was sent out, arriving in Estacada 11 p. m.

RECOLLECTIONS OF OLD TIME OREGONIANS

AS TO WEATHER CONDITIONS OF THE PAST

We have endeavored to interview the old settlers as to their recollections of weather conditions in this vicinity and here is what they say: Mr. Henry Dullison: "I have been here for fifty years and I have seen several such Winters as we are having, in that time although nothing like this has occurred in the last fifteen years. I have seen the snow lay for from four to six weeks, but again it is liable to go off with rain in the next day or two."

Mr. J. C. Duns said: "About twenty-four years ago I was living in the George district and we had at that time even more snow than we now have. It laid for about four weeks."

W. T. Cross, of Currieville said: "We are going to have this kind of weather for the next six weeks. I remember one time when I was a boy about twelve years old, we had a worse storm than this. Most of the stock died that Spring as the result of the storm and for want of sufficient feed."

Mr. George Lockerby said: "I have lived here for twenty-seven years and never before this Tuesday morning did I see the temperature below zero. The Winter of '83 and '84 we had more snow than now. At Garfield the snow was over two feet deep and I think laid almost a month. At another time we had a deep snow in the morning and I thought I would go down to Wilson's and make a small sled. I had it made in a short time but I had to pull it home later in the day on bare ground. In '89 we had about a foot of snow, the weather conditions were two degrees above zero, the coldest I ever saw it, to remember, in Oregon until now."

Mr. Wade said: "I have lived on this land for fifty-eight years and I remember several Winters similar to this and some where even more snow than now is here, fall, in Jan'y, '83 I have a record of the weather being one degree below zero."

Edwin Bates said: "I have lived here since January 1871 and I have seen several Winters such as this but never in all that time did I witness what I saw Monday. Fifteen vehicles on runners, sleighs and sleds all in line. The incident referred to was witnessed at the funeral of Mr. Crawford."

Wiley Howell said: "Here's my sled made fifteen years ago and never had a tongue in it until now. At that time we had three feet of snow in Springfield and we started to make a sled. The snow went off before we got it completed and this is the first time since then we had an opportunity to use it."

G. B. Linn said: "I have lived on these flats since 1865. I have seen more snow at different times than we now have but in my opinion this is the coldest weather we ever experienced in my recollection. I have seen the snow lay for three or four weeks."

In a recent issue of the Progress we note a resolution from the Garfield Grange approving of the Mayor and City Council in their efforts to enforce the prohibition regulations. I had expected to see something said by those directly interested, the tax payers of Estacada. I therefore desire to say that I believe as firmly as anyone else in the enforcement of law and good order and believe I speak for a majority of the tax-payers of our city when I say we are and always have been anxious that law and good order should prevail. We do not approve, however, of the funds (?) in the city treasury being used in a wasteful manner to satisfy the personal enmity of a single individual, or combination of individuals. We are not upholding friend or foe. If the local option in Estacada is being violated, if we do not have common intelligence in our community sufficient to prosecute the case lawfully, that let us use this wasted money to hire a good city attorney to tell us how to live and what is law. Certainly the salary of a good attorney will not cost the city as much as paying costs of prosecution expenses etc and accomplishing nothing. I as a taxpayer do not approve of such action by the council or mayor of wasting the peoples money. I am also loyal enough to Oregon and to Estacada to use home products as much as possible and buy in Estacada so far as possible for my needs, preferring to leave the money at home. This however is not practiced by several persons living in this locality, including city officials, so it is said. They go to Portland leave their money there and bring their "load" "jag" "drunk" or whatever you choose to call it, home with them so that we have the effects of the drink and Portland has the money for it.
