

In mixing, the sand should first be pread on the platform to a depth of three to five inches. Empty the desired number of sacks of cement on top of the sand and turn dry with a shovel until thoroughly mixed when the whole mass will have a uniform color. The required amount of gravel should now added on top of the sand and cement, the whole turned over once a day, and the turning continue until the whole mass is thoroughly mixed, and of a rather shiny nature. The amount of water needed will depend largely on the nature and dryness of the sand and gravel and can best be determined by adding the water with a bucket rathe slowly to the first batch until the prop er consistency has been attained.

For most farm work a fairly wet tamping, is preferred.

For making fence posts, drain tile, etc., where specified forms are used, drier mixture is to be preferred. In general it may be said that the dryer the mixture the more ramming or tamping is required. But in no case the tamping be neglected Enough ramming should always be done to insure that the mass is as dense as it is possible to make it.

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


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
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
