Day Starts Out To Be Bad Man

Chas. Day, a wood cutter at Morrow Station started out to be a bad man on Saturday. Mr. Day is well known in Estacada having on various occasions taken his phonograph to the pavilion to entertain at the dances. He was always a very quiet man and never took part in society and having few companions. He was not given to drink for he never was seen about the saloon.

He is reported to have been acting strangely for a couple of weeks. Having set fire to an out building on Friday night, so it is charged, and lay in wait, as he told in the morning, for someone to come and put the fire out, when, as he says, he intended to shoot.

On Saturday morning about nine o'clock he had some of his belongings packed up and he requested Arthur Howard to help him carry his bundles down to the river where a boat used to cross the river was. Mr. Howard refused to help him, when he pointed a gun in his face and demanded that he comply at once which Mr. Howard did. On the way down he informed Howard that two companions were waiting for him on the other side of the river and that they intended to rob a bank and that he would then send Howard some money. After crossing the river he headed for the plank-road leading to Oregon City and Mr. Howard came to Estacada and called for Sheriff Beatie at Oregon City to inform him of the incident.

Louis Gerber and George Schultz had started from Estacada to go to Logan with a buggy and Day was standing by the road side and came up to them as if to enter into conversation. Day said they were just the people he was looking for and that they should get out and let him have the buggy and horse as he needed it, they thinking he was joking with them did not comply, when he suddenly pulled a gun and pointed it at them and told them he meant business. When the two saw the gun they decided he could have it and got out. Day also asked them for money, saying he had gotten into trouble and wished to get away. They gave him five dollars and Schultz informed him that it was all the money he had, so Day returned two bits saying that would be carfare for him to return with. Day only drove the horse and buggy a short distance and tied it up and Gerber and Schultz recovered it and went to the home of J. C. Young and telephoned to the sheriff and also to Estacada, of their experience. W. A. Jones, the constable of this district made preparations and drove out to intercept Day, as it was considered that he certainly must have gone insane. In the party that drove from here were W. A. Jones, John Jones, H. W. Blood and Ed. Close.

It was learned before starting that Day was at the home of J. C. Young, where he had gone into and at the point of his gun had demanded something to eat. On arriving at the place Day was found standing on the porch and as W. A. Jones approached he informed him that he was willing to give up his guns and began by handing over a rifle and three revolvers and about three hundred rounds of ammunition.

Day was brought to Estacada and as he had donned a false mustache and whiskers and had other disguises among his luggage, created considerable curiosity when he was brought to Estacada about six o'clock in the evening. W. A. Jones had previously telephoned Sheriff Beatie of the arrest and that he would take him to Oregon City on the late car. Jones had no trouble whatever in making the trip to Oregon City where a charge of insanity was made against him and he was held for examination.

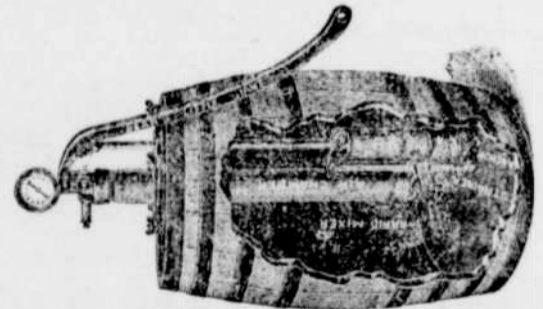
