Farmers' Institute Held

The Farmers' Institute held in the I. O. O. F. Hall Estacada on Tuesday, under the auspices of the Oregon Agricultural College, and Garfield Grange No. 317 was largely attended. The Institute was called at 11 A. M. when some preliminary work was done after which an adjournment was taken until 1:30 when Prof. C. E. Bradley, Station Chemist, gave a lecture on the chemistry of the soil illustrating his lecture by chart. This was followed by Mr. Wm. Schuler, one of Washington County's successful dairymen. His talk on the dairy herd was instructive as well as entertaining and from his experience it is a profitable part of farming when the proper means are used which he says we have in our community if we will but use them. Prof. C. I. Lewis followed with a lecture on Horticulture, after which an adjournment was taken at 5 P. M. until 7:30.

When the Institute re-convened it was with a crowded house, standing room being at a premium. Several instrumental selections were rendered by Mr. Ed Hunt on the viola with Mr. H. G. Bonney, piano accompanist. Prof. James Dryden then began his stereopticon illustrated lecture on the poultry industry which was very entertaining and instructive. One of the lessons among others that we carried away with us was the impression that it was much easier to produce pictures of good laying hens than it is to make good layers out of them when eggs are worth fifty cents a dozen. The children of the Estacada School under the leadership of Miss Stevens and Miss Pruner added to the evening entertainment. Mrs. Dr. Adix was pianist during the song, "Iola," by Mildred Perry. Dr. Withcombe closed the Institute by a continuation of the illustrations showing the college buildings and their general agricultural lines. Those in attendance express themselves as being well paid and entertained for the time they spent at the Institute.

E. P. Scott left on Tuesday for Roseburg where he expects to do painting and paper-hanging.

G. P. Boyer came home from the hospital at Portland on Thursday. While there he underwent a surgical operation for appendicitis. Mr. Boyer is still in a weak condition but he hopes soon to recover entirely. He desires us to thank the many people who were so kind to him before he went to the hospital.

Will Build a Depot

Vice President Hunt and Master Mechanic Kinney of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. was in Estacada on Thursday looking over the ground for the purpose of erecting a suitable waiting room and freight depot combined. They conferred with the business men in reference to a location and will report what in their opinion will be the most advisable. The Company will act upon this report and will then decide upon location and building. It is to be hoped the new depot will be speedily erected for the facilities for freight are far below the demands and we have heard the farmers complain of having no place to store their freight and there is no place whatever for passengers waiting for a car to be accommodated. We are glad to see the company preparing to care for their growing trade in this vicinity and while the officials report a loss of twenty-three per cent in freight traffic on this end of the line for 1908, there is a very good reason for it owing to the condition of the lumber industry and the fact that our mills have been mostly idle except for local demands. Also the summer passenger traffic was not near so great as usual, this probably was in part due to the company not
