### Big Improvements to be Made in Park

The Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. is engaged in beautifying the lawn about the Hotel Estacada and the Park. A flower garden 100 x 400 ft. in the Park, south of the track is part of the improvement and others will be added. All the dead trees are to be removed, stumps taken out, logs and other rubbish removed. A new fence will be placed about the Park also a new one about the lawn surrounding the Hotel. The building which stands at the rear end will be removed and part of the lawn and the ground now occupied by this building will be made into a vegetable garden. For some time the rail road company had not done much toward keeping up the interest in the Park. We are glad to note these improvements for the beauty as well as utility of our surrounding make the impressions.
