Another law suit has been added to the city expense by the present city management. When the city officials changed the pipe line it is claimed by the Stubbes, they violated a contract the city had with them and now these differences have culminated in injunction proceedings that are sure to end in a lawsuit.

W. H. Holder, of Garfield, sold his farm of eighty acres to P. Conklin, of Linnton, Ore. The state orchard which Mr. Holder has on the premises will be transferred to him. He expects to take charge of it in the near future. The consideration was \$8000. Mr. Holder has not determined his plans for the future.

### A Little Information

#### To the Public

The city has another lawsuit to defend. This makes the second since the present administration took possession of its affairs. The first one is where the Mayor and City Council repudiated the city's debt in refusing to pay the interest on its bonded indebtedness. The citizens of Estacada do not realize how serious the repudiation of a bonded indebtedness is or how much harm it will do the credit of the city until the necessity comes to float more bonds to carry on some important project. It is then they will learn the harm one single individual can do them. It is folly to talk about it being an illegal indebtedness in the face of the facts, which are, that a city council and a called public meeting advised its purchase, also the very man who was defeated in his plans is now Mayor by appointment (not by election) has seen fit to disregard the wishes of the citizens of Estacada and prefers to gratify a personal desire to hurt some one who he considers an enemy.

Also this same man, with the aid of the present Council, has spent almost three thousand dollars of a balance found in the water funds and its revenues since which makes a total of at least four thousand dollars spent from an enterprise that the city does not own, according to his contention. Do you suppose that any court of justice would entertain such a proposition?

Further this same individual is now directing the forces that are spending the city's money in a profligate manner and especially the water fund, instead of applying it to legitimate obligations that it should be used for.

For these, and various other reasons, it is very probable that the Recall Measure will at once be set in motion to save the city's credit and its finances from further injury. A call of the city's business men has been made to determine a method of curbing these personal ambitions.

### The Schools Closed

The Estacada schools were closed on Tuesday by the board of directors owing to the prevalence in the schools of a few cases of scarlatina and it was thought best to the health of the community to take this action.
