**A Sad Incident Occurs**

A sad incident to relate has just happened to one of our citizens who has been connected with the growth of Estacada, being proprietor of the Portland Restaurant, conducting a barber shop and recently had engaged in the butchering business conducting the Palace Meat Market. We refer to M. H. Richards, who for some time observing ones have taken note of the queer things done by him, and it has been noticed that he has been failing, consequently the local lodge of I. O. O. F., of which he was a member, finally took action in the matter and Deputy Miles, of Oregon City, went to Portland on Sunday and induced Mr. Richards to accompany him to Oregon City where he was kept under restraint at a hotel under the care of a guardian until an examination of his sanity could be made, which was done on Monday. After examination by an insanity commission, was declared insane and committed to the hospital for the insane at Salem taking a car, in care of an attendant sent from Salem for this purpose, at four o'clock P. M. Monday. His peculiar form of mental aberration as diagnosed by Dr. Adix and confirmed by the insanity commission is Pareisis, a not uncommon disease and one whose termination is fatal. The I. O. O. F. Lodge has taken charge of him and his family and will try to straighten out his business at the earliest possible moment. The lodge committee consists of J. W. Reed, E. M. Miller and Dr. H. V. Adix. The County Court appointing E. M. Miller Guardian for his person and property.
