Portland merchants met at the Commercial Club this week and took steps to decorate the city thoroughly in honor of the many visitors who will attend the Rose Festival early in June. The retailers plan to make their stores highly attractive for out of town guests and tourists who will be here for Festival week. Places of business will be transformed into perfect bowers of beauty for the delight of visitors. The work of embellishing floral designs on shop windows about town is now going on. Flags and festival colors will be put up next week. Rose decorations of the business houses will be delayed until the festival opens on June 7th, when the queen flower will reign supreme about the city.
