REED WINS IN FIGHT FOR MAYOR

Estacada's Good Name Vindicated and the Repudiator of its Financial Obligations and Villifier of its Citizens Put "Down and Out"

Overwhelming Defeat at the Polls

Tuesday was the day long looked for by the electors of the city of Estacada. It was their opportunity to correct a wrong and avenge an insult perpetrated by the city council, when more than a year ago they elected W. A. Heylman, Mayor. A man with nothing to commend him except being a knocker, trouble breeder and villifier of its citizen, in methods peculiarly Heylman-like. In his effort to succeed himself he resorted to methods that would put to shame the worst "heeler" in a Chicago ward election. His schemes have been recently carefully looked for and check-mated. The main reason he has been able to do the harm to the taxpayers he has done is that we are a peace loving community and averse to taking part in a "scrap" which left the field clear for him until Estacada, in the language of Judge Campbell, "had become notorious" for the scrap in its midst. The people of Estacada are peaceable but with a man of Heylman's disposition and the few barnacles he succeeded in making fast to him, that he seemed to control in a manner impossible to conceive of, could do, it was found that to longer stand aloof would be criminal.

Accordingly it was determined that W. A. Heylman should have all the fight and law he wanted and a stand taken to resist him. This resulted in the recall election held May 15th. In which it was clearly shown that the people of our city were against him and his methods. Tuesday's election was the culmination of the bitter feeling against this man's methods of doing things. The poll tax method by which he hoped to disfranchise a sufficient number of people to win the election was not successful. He was successful in making his scheme work, but the trouble with it was that he could poll such a few votes for himself then that he was defeated two votes to his one.

His methods had been discovered and it was understood by the citizens the evening before that the voters should be present early to vote and thus compel him to show his plans early. Consequently as soon as the polls were open the challenging by Heylman on the poll tax commenced.

We are not finding fault with him for challenging, but we are, and have reason, to find fault with two of the judges, who represented the Heylman side of the issue, for their manner of allowing votes. These decisions were made with disgusting frequency until about thirty of Estacada's citizens were disfranchised. Notwithstanding this was about one third of Estacada's vote it failed to give the majority sought for. It must be remembered that these disfranchised voters were for the Reed ticket.

The Reed ticket would have polled at least seventy-five votes for their candidates. The vote as counted was as follows: Mayor, W. A. Heylman 21, J. W. Reed 42. Councilmen, L. E. Belfils 43, B. O. Boswell 18, C. F. Howe 24, A. E. Sparks 38, Chas. Shutter 45, A. Morrow 1, A. Havens 22, Al Lindsey 39, W. D. Henthorn 42, J. F. Lovelace 20, Treasurer, B. R. Kimmel 42, Ed. Bates 10, Recorder, Wm. Dale 22, E. S. Womer, 38.
