School Meeting Held

The annual school meeting of this district, No. 108, was held on Monday evening at 8 o'clock p. m. at the school building and was well attended. Mr. C. F. Howe, the retiring director, called the meeting to order. The other members of the board all being present, these were directors T. J. Reagan and John Stormer and school clerk L. E. Belfils. The school meeting showed the same interest in educational matters that has always characterized these meetings, with practically a unanimous opinion favoring progressive methods and a liberal use of money to accomplish it and the willingness to vote a tax necessary to sustain the policy.

This is commendable for the district and as long as the policy is pursued we can expect people to settle with us for this reason alone, the advantage of good schools.

The remarks of Principal James clearly indicate that it will only be a short time until it will be necessary for us to build an addition to our school building. At the time the present building was erected we prided ourselves on having a good school building and one that would meet the demands for many years. Now we might as well commence making preparations and plans for it, for it is coming much sooner than we anticipated, the necessity of increased facilities to carry on our ever increasing school work.

It was decided to wait until we find out what the assessed valuation is before voting the tax. It has been our practice heretofore at this meeting to estimate these matters and lay the tax from our estimate. The calling of a special meeting for this purpose, when the assessed valuation is known, is such a small matter that it was decided the best thing to do, accordingly the matter was deferred. We would suggest that it would be a good thing for the district, when they lay their tax to bear in mind that the school bonds will be coming due before long and that if we levy a tax sufficient to have a surplus fund it will come in handy when these bonds mature, or additional money is needed for additions.

The increased valuation to the district in improvements, particularly in railway and power plants, will aid very materially in solving what the third ones might consider a financial problem of magnitude.

We do not advise that a burden should be placed upon the few, not even if they were willing to bear it, and the entire debts canceled. Let us lay plans for the future and let the recipients of the benefits, who will be benefited by a wise and well laid educational policy, help to pay for it.

A new teacher will be added this year, making five employed.

The school report showed that at the close of the school every available seat was filled, although at the commencement of the term ample provisions had been made.

Two candidates were presented to be voted for as director for three years, J. W. Reed and F. J. Harkentler. Reed was declared elected. L. E. Belfils had no opposition as clerk and he will serve the ensuing year.
