Oregon lumbermen will participate quite generally in the semi annual meeting of the Western Pine Manufacturers' Association at Spokane on August 9. The program is an interesting one and many will go from this state. Among the speakers will be Gifford Pinchot, United States Forester. Conservation and reforestation are subjects that will be discussed and are of general interest to lumber men.

Hogs continue to make new records in the Portland market. What is said to have been the highest price ever paid in any market in the United States was realized here during the past week when \$9.50 was paid for a bunch of fine porkers. Many other sales at better than \$9 per 100 pounds were made in the local stockyards. These attractive figures ought to encourage farmers to raise more hogs.
