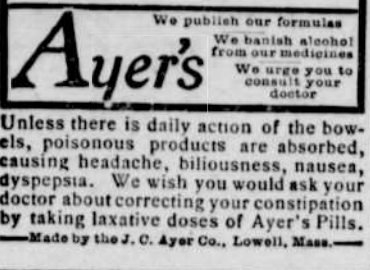

DEATH WATCH BY JOHNSON ENDED

Long Fight for Life Lost by Governor of Minnesota.

Three Times Elected Chief Executive of His State and Was Candidate for Democratic Nomination for President of United States—End Comes at Early Hour.

Rochester, Minn., Sept. 21.—Governor John A. Johnson, three times elected governor of Minnesota and a candidate for the Democratic nomination for the presidency of the United States, and looked upon by many as the possible Democratic standard bearer in 1912, died at St. Mary's hospital here at 3:25 o'clock this morning following an operation last Wednesday.

Death watch was kept at the bedside of Governor John A. Johnson all day yesterday. Mrs. Johnson and two attending physicians sat by the dying man, hourly expecting the end. At intervals bulletins were issued, and each message from the sickroom was less hopeful than the one preceding.

In the early morning Drs. Charles and William Mayo issued the first bulletin: "Governor Johnson has not made natural progress; his condition is grave," it read, and warning friends at once stormed the hospital for further news.

At 2:30 p. m. word came from the sick room that the governor had been in a semi-comatose condition for two hours. The source of this information said the patient might continue in this state for days, but there was slim hope that he would live more than a few hours.

Next came the brief bulletin, "Life is fast ebbing."

At 1:15 this morning Dr. Mayo said: "There is absolutely no hope. However, the governor may not die for several hours yet, possibly not before 6 o'clock."

At 12 o'clock Governor Johnson was conscious and complained of being uncomfortable. He was conscious almost all night and evidently realized the end was drawing near, although he said nothing.

SOUTH IS STORMSWEEP.

Gulf Hurricane Brings Death and Destruction.

New Orleans, Sept. 21.—After attaining a velocity of 60 miles an hour at New Orleans last night, the West Indian hurricane that struck the Louisiana and Mississippi gulf coast was reduced in its intensity.

It left four dead at New Orleans and perhaps others along the gulf coast, though no definite advices of mortality in other sections have been thus far reported here.

The property loss in New Orleans will exceed \$100,000. Many houses were unroofed and many frail buildings were partially destroyed. To ascertain the loss of life or property along the gulf coast, the ferry steamer Assumption sank, but no lives were lost. Much property along the river front was damaged.

Taft Reviews Troops.

Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 21.—With a review of 5,200 soldiers from all over the Middle West by President Taft yesterday the greatest army maneuvers and tournament in the history of the country began.

Brigadier General Charles E. Morton, commanding the department of the Missouri, stationed at Fort Omaha, is in command of the operations.

Cavalry, infantry and artillery took part in the tournament. Many valuable prizes are offered for the best tactics, feats of horsemanship and evolutions. The Third battalion, Sixteenth infantry, captured first prize for wall scaling. A record of 27 seconds was made.

Old English Coin Valuable.

Rich Hill, Mo., Sept. 21.—Tom Brown, an English coal miner residing at Panama, a coal camp four miles south of this city, is the lucky holder of a five guinea English gold piece, dated 1691. It had been handed down in the Brown family from one generation to another until now. It is valued at \$3,850. At least that is the offer made by a Boston coin dealer. Only two coins of this denomination and date are known to exist, one having recently been purchased by the English government.

Opium Will Do Good.

Manila, Sept. 21.—The Philippine government soon will ship to Washington nearly half a ton of opium—the proceeds of many customs seizures. The government plans to dispose of the opium for medicinal purposes among drug manufacturers, receiving in exchange medicines for the use of hospitals, dispensaries and other government institutions in the Philippines. When the transaction is completed the bureau of health will make cash returns to the bureau of customs for the tariff duty of the seizures.

To Remove Fulton's Body.

New York, Sept. 21.—The surviving grandchildren of Robert Fulton, in a letter addressed to Cornelius Vanderbilt, president of the Fulton monument association, sanctioned today the removal of Fulton's body from a vault in Trinity church to a mausoleum and memorial to be built in Riverside drive. The movement for the Fulton memorial has been under way for some time and \$40,000 has been subscribed. In all it is proposed to expend \$3,000,000.

Cuban Are Telegraph.

Havana, Sept. 21.—Telegraph wires and bridges between Havana and Pinar del Rio are still down and consequently it has been impossible to ascertain the extent of the damage wrought by the storm in that section. It has been learned, however, that many hundreds of peasants are destitute because of the destruction of their huts and crops.

JURY TAMPERING FOUND.

Chicago Investigations Promise Huge Scandal in County Affairs.

Chicago, Sept. 20.—A gigantic conspiracy for the "fixing" of grand juries of Cook county, extending back over a year and culminating in the fraudulent certification of names for the October grand jury, was revealed today, when State's Attorney Wayman secured bench warrants for John J. Holland, secretary of the Cook county jury commission; Jury Commissioner Willis J. Rayburn, and Nicholas A. Martin, Alderman Michael Kenna's secretary, on a charge of tampering with jurors.

The warrants were issued today by Judge Jesse A. Baldwin, of the circuit court.

The charge against the three is that they conspired to draw names of grand jurors in a manner other than that required by law.

(Coming at the height of the trial of Inspector McCann for alleged grafting, the news of the action based on alleged tampering with the jury lists caused great excitement in legal and political circles. The complaint on which the warrants were issued were drawn up by a special agent of the state's attorney, who has been investigating the jury-drawing methods for weeks.)

Under the state law the names of prospective grand jurors are selected at random from a sealed box containing the names of 1500 citizens who have been examined for jury service by the jury commissioners and their fitness certified. The method is prescribed for petit jury lists.

NEW DUTIES HURT.

French Lace Manufacturers Hard Hit by American Tariff.

Paris, Sept. 20.—What France thinks of America's new tariff schedule is being evidenced in no uncertain fashion these days, and the attitude of French manufacturers generally is correctly expressed by lace and tulle-makers of Calais, who for generations have exported their fine products, with the women of the United States its best customers.

As a direct result of the 70 per cent tariff on laces and tulles, which the recently adopted tariff law of the United States has marked up on this class of manufactures, Calais is threatened with the loss of many inhabitants.

Former great prosperity of this city has dwindled almost to the vanishing point. Conditions here finally become so aggravated that long-established business men are abandoning their establishments and moving away from the city. Feeling runs high in Calais against employers.

AMERICAN SURGEONS LEAD.

Doctor Says Foolish to Go Abroad for Treatment.

New York, Sept. 20.—Dr. Lewis Livingston Seaman, one of the delegates to the recent international medical congress at Budapest, arrived on the steamer Campania from Liverpool, and spoke encouragingly of the progress made by America and the success of the congress.

"The Americans are far ahead of other nations in many branches of surgery and medicine," said Dr. Seaman, "as shown by the testimony and the exhibits at the congress. This is particularly true in the case of appendicitis, where we excel both in the treatment of the disease and the technique of the operation."

Speaking generally, Dr. Seaman said it was the height of insanity for Americans to go abroad for treatment by foreign specialists when there are physicians at home who could "walk all around" the European medical men.

Japanese May Soon Fly.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 20.—The interesting announcement is made that a society for aeronautic research has been formed in Japan, under the title of the Temporary Military Balloon Investigation Society. It is to consist of 20 members, selected from officers on the active list of the army and navy, and from men of science in general. The selection of the president and members will be made by the minister of war, with the approval of the cabinet. Nothing is definitely stated as to the provision of funds, but apparently the duty of financing the enterprise will devolve upon the departments of war and navy.

French Surgeon Studies Tuberculosis.

Marysville, Cal., Sept. 20.—Dr. Arnold De Palaise, a French surgeon, who is circling the globe on foot at the expense of the French government for the purpose of studying tuberculosis and to give advice to the victims of the disease, is in the city. He will leave today for San Francisco, and from there he will walk to Seattle. Dr. De Palaise was formerly a surgeon in the French army. In 1904 he left Paris, and since then has traversed all of Europe, and has toured Siberia, South America, Africa and North America.

Grasshoppers in California.

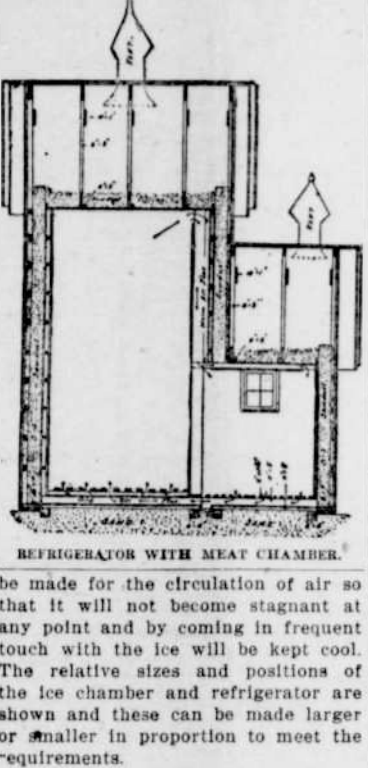
San Bernardino, Cal., Sept. 20.—This city was overrun last night by millions of grasshoppers that took possession of the streets and disappeared mysteriously this morning. Last evening myriads of the insects made their appearance, literally covering the streets and sidewalks in the business and residence sections of the city. They disappeared with the approach of daylight. According to reports from Highland and other points in the valley, the pest is confined to this city. No damage to crops has been reported.

Steamer Ohio to Junk.

Seattle, Sept. 20.—The safe of the wrecked steamer Ohio was brought down from Victoria on the Inoquo. It had previously been taken to Victoria by the Canadian salvage vessel Salvor, and it now rests at the Colman dock here. The safe and its contents were intact, and there was a large sum of money in it when opened. The figures given are \$167,000. The wreck of the Ohio itself will probably be broken up for junk.

MEAT AND GARDEN

The accompanying illustration shows the plan of refrigerator with meat chamber attached, the accompanying illustration is given. Provision must



be made for the circulation of air so that it will not become stagnant at any point and by coming in frequent touch with the ice will be kept cool. The relative sizes and positions of the ice chamber and refrigerator are shown and these can be made larger or smaller in proportion to meet the requirements.

Keeping the Wheat Pure.

One of the most important factors in growing improved wheat for seed is to keep the wheat pure. Many farmers are careless on this point, often planting new seed on old wheat

hollows hole under the wall—in fact, several holes—near his cabbage field. He armed himself with several steel traps and used all his cunning in setting them in the burrows of the woodchucks, but after several mornings of patient waiting, capture by trap proved unsuccessful. But, having heard that they were very fond of salt, he mixed a liberal quantity of Paris green in about a quart of salt and placed a handful near each burrow. He was not troubled again that season, and this has been his remedy ever since.

The Dutch Mutch.

Shallow cultivation conserves the moisture and prevents it from escaping from the surface. Every time rain falls the loose ground absorbs more than does the hard soil, as the letter permits the water to flow off. When the rain goes down into the soil, and the soil is then loosened, the capillary tubes are sealed and the flow of water upward is arrested. A loose top soil, therefore, not only permits of securing a large share of water from each rain, but also retains it.

Destructive Rats.

According to a recent report of the biological survey of the Department of Agriculture, rats destroy annually \$100,000,000 worth of American grain. It is estimated that one rat will eat 60 cents' worth of grain in a year, while of oatmeal it will consume \$1.50 worth. Rat-proof construction, especially the use of concrete foundations, is urged, as well as some rational method of disposing of garbage and storing food.

Ammonia as a Fertilizer.

The value of sulphate of ammonia as a fertilizer was demonstrated in some German tests where marsh lands were fertilized with nitrate of soda and sulphate of ammonia. With both sulphate and nitrate the plants receiving sulphate yielded much more than those receiving nitrate. These results indicate that on marsh lands a liberal supply of lime or sulphate of ammonia may be advantageously substituted for nitrate of soda and confirms the wisdom of the practice common in Germany.

THE COWPEA AS A FERTILIZER.

The cow pea is a large beanlike plant that produces a large amount of forage. It is valuable as a green food or for plowing under for green manure. It has been used successfully for improving wornout soils, especially those that are light and sandy in texture. Its greatest advantage for this purpose is its ability to gather nitrogen from the air and mineral elements from subsoil. When the crop is plowed under, these are left near the surface, where they will be available to shallow-rooted crops and those which cannot get nitrogen from the air. It has been little used for hay in the North, because it cannot be readily dried in this climate. It makes a good green feed for milch cows between August 15 and September 15, or it may be preserved in the silo by mixing with corn fodder. For green manuring the seed should be sown broadcast in late June or early July, at the rate of one and a half bushels per acre. It is especially valuable for growing in young orchards. When wanted for fodder it should be sown in early June, in drills 2 1/2 feet apart, at the rate of one bushel seed per acre.

Fly Repeller.

The Kansas Agricultural College has experimented with the various chemical formulas to repel flies from live stock and recommends the following as fairly satisfactory: Resin, 1 1/2 pounds; laundry soap, two cakes; fish oil, one-half pint; enough water to make three gallons. Dissolve resin in a solution of soap and water by heating, add the fish oil and the rest of the water. Apply with a brush. If to be used as a spray, add one-half pint of kerosene. This mixture will cost 7 to 8 cents a gallon and one-half pint is considered enough for one application for a cow. At first it will be necessary to use two or three applications per week until the outer ends of the hair become coated with the resin. After that retouch those parts where the resin is rubbed off.

Forms of Hoofs.

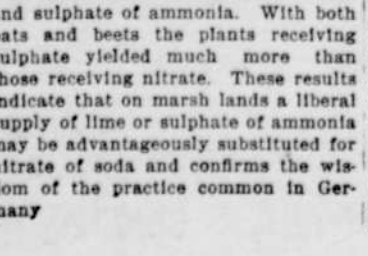
Fig. 1. The form of a horse's foot determines the peculiarities of the shoe that is best adapted to it. Viewing the foot from the side the regular position is that shown in figure 4, in which the weight will be borne to best advantage. Looking from the front the regular form is that shown in figure 1, the wide toe being indicated by figure 2, and the narrow toe by figure 3. With the regular or normal shape the weight falls near the center of the hoof, and is evenly distributed over the whole bottom of the hoof. The toe points straight forward and when the horse is moving forward in a straight line the hoofs are picked up and carried forward in a line parallel to the middle line of the body. A pair of hoofs of the form shown in figure 2 allows the

weight to fall largely into the inner half of the hoof. In motion the hoof is moved in a circle. Horses that are "toe-wide" are likely to interfere with

ground, thus allowing it to become mixed with volunteer wheat the first year. This mixing of varieties causes wheat to deteriorate in yield and quality. When wheat is grown for seed it should be on clean land, which is free from volunteer wheat and from other volunteer grain, rye being especially objectionable. Care must be taken in harvesting and threshing the seed wheat to keep it from becoming mixed with other varieties of wheat. Again, in order to maintain the quality and yield of what it is necessary to maintain the fertility of the soil and to give the land good culture.—Farmers' Mail and Breeze.
