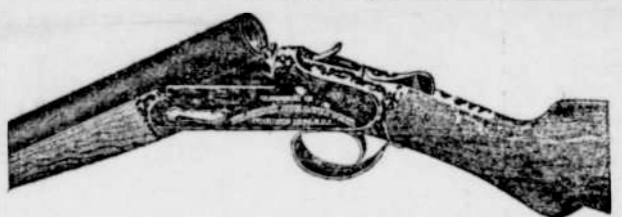

Club House For Employees

The Portland Railway, Light & Power Company to Build Club House at Golf Links

Plans are being prepared for the erection of a two-story brick structure 30x90 feet in size, which will be built by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company at the Golf Links, near the new car barn now being erected by the company in that location. This building will be used as a club house for the employees of the street railway system and will meet a long-felt want in that respect. The lower floor will contain the reporting room, the store room, lunch room, superintendent's office, bath rooms and toilets. On the second floor will be the reading room, smoking room, billiard room, recreation room, lounging room, also several small bedrooms for use of belated employees. It is estimated that the structure will cost not less than \$10,000 and is only one of a number of similar buildings which the company intends to erect in the vicinity of the different barns. Plans and specifications will be ready for figuring in a short time and will be announced later.
